#### **Hello October**

October starts on Thursday this week. It shouldn't be a surprise since the stores already have the Halloween stuff on display!



"October" was the name of the eighth month of the year in the ancient Roman calendar. When the Romans converted to a 12-month calendar by adding January and February, the name "October" stuck.

OCTOBER NIGHT SKIES

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#### Draconide

Keep an eye out for the Draconid meteor shower – sometimes called the Giacobinids – that is expected to peak at nightfall or early evening on October 7th though under a moon-drenched sky. The radiant point for the Draconid meteor shower almost coincides with the head of the constellation Draco the Dragon in the northern sky.

#### Orionids

The Orionids run from October 2nd to November 7th this year and are a medium strength shower that sometimes reaches high strength activity. In a normal year the Orionids produce 10-20 shower members at maximum. The Orionids will next peak on the Oct 20-21 night. On this night, the moon will be 23% full.

#### Southern Taurids

The Southern Taurids are a long-lasting shower that has several minor peaks during its activity period. The shower is active for more than two months (September 10th to November 20th) but rarely produces more than five shower members per hour, even at maximum activity. The Taurids (both branches) are rich in fireballs and are often responsible for increased number of fireball reports from September through November.

The Southern Taurids will next peak on the Oct 29-30 night. On this night, the moon will be 98% full.

#### **Full Hunter's Moon**

Thursday, October 1st, is the rising of the Full Hunter's Moon.

Most of our monthly Moon names come from Native American and early American folklore. However, the Full Hunter's Moon is one of

two Moons that is a **longstanding** astronomical term.

Specifically, the Hunter's Moon is always the first full Moon after the Harvest Moon (which is the closest full moon to the autumnal equinox).

The Hunter's Moon rises right around sunset—and sets around sunrise. It's the only night in the month when the Moon is in the sky all night long.

Because the Hunter's Moon rises around sunset near the horizon, it may appear bigger and more orange than your typical Moon. However, this is just the "Moon Illusion.

In the autumn months, there's no long period of darkness between sunset and moonrise for several days in a row, around the time of full moon. In the days before tractor lights, the lamp of the Harvest Moon helped farmers to gather their crops, despite the diminishing daylight hours. As the sun's light faded in the west, the moon would soon rise in the east to illuminate the fields throughout the night. A month later, after the harvest was done, the full Hunter's Moon was said to illuminate the prey of hunters, scooting along in the stubble left behind in the fields.

The materials in the piece must be agriculturally based


OR

A quilt made from used feed bags, a sculpture made with hay bales, a giant cowboy made out of old farm equipment.
