Public Hearings

There have been literally dozens of property owners in our area that have requested to be part of the Kingsbury city limits! And now the work has started to have 31 of these properties become part of the City of Kingsbury. Part of the legal process in making that **happen** is to have two public hearings where the people can voice their comments, ask questions, and be a big part of the process.

The first of these public hearings will be Saturday, January 19th at three locations in the vicinity of the properties:

Part 1 - 11:00 am at 190 Pershing Ln. at the Old Kingsbury Aerodrome Part 2 - 11:30 am at 668 Railway Street at the tree Part 3 - 12:00 pm at 1400 Prairie Lea Road at Brown Road

The second public hearing will be Monday, January 21st 6:30 pm at the Kingsbury VFD fire station.

The members of the Kingsbury City Commission welcome and encourage the public to attend!

Kingsbury News Past

All the **news** that's fit to print about what was happening in Kingsbury . . .


The August 3, 1902 edition of the *Austin American-Statesman* had an extensive "Texas Cotton Crop" report for the "Cotton Belt." Due to too much rain, lack of rain, worms, weevils, "shedding", etc. most of it was not very good! The Kingsbury report was submitted by Mr. J.A. Lynch and the crop here was the "worst ever known." The entire page on the cotton crop was pretty much the same as this snippet - 1902 was not the year for the cotton crop.



Kerrville, Tex., (Kerr, 1182)-Suffering severely. Some hope for average crop. Immediate rains essential. Chas. Schreiner Co. Kenedy, Tex. (Karnes, 12,296)—Cotton crop barely average. G. S. Coom. Iowa Park, Tex., (Wichita, —)— Crops make about half; needing rain. R. Ferguson. Hallettsville, Tex., (Lavaca, 27,003)-Showers last ten days; bad condition. Weevil increasing; shedding badly. K. Dornak. Gainesville, Tex., (Cooke, 20,346)-Account drouth, 18,000 bales now indicated Cook county. John King & Co. Glddings, Tex., (Lee, 13,282)—Con-ditions fair but too much rain; fear of worms. Max Gans.
Goliad, Tex. (Goliad, 9204)—Condition not good: about 75 per cent last year. W. B. Campbell.
Spring Creek, Tex. (Throckmorton, 275)—Prospects for cotton favorable. corn lost; feed cr Reagan Merc. Co. feed crop being planted. Emery, Tex., (Rains, 5399)—Crop equal to 1900, same time; too much rain, M. S. Pierson, El Campo, Tex., (Wharton, 18,701) Cotton shedding; too much rain will make opening late. Gus Caweille & Bro. Edna, Tex., (Jackson, 3465)-Weevil at work; will cut cotton 10 per cent. J. W. Allen. Dunn, Tex., (Scurry, 55, forage 90, I. N. Anderson, Tex., (Delta, 30,435)—Plant Tex., (Delta, 30,435)—Plant First 65, forage 90. growth good; boll worm doing some damage; weather unfavorable. First National Bank

But the big story that day was that "Tracy" was seen again and still heading for the "Hole in the Wall" country in Wyoming. This would have been outlaw Harry Tracy who was indeed once a member of Butch Cassidy's Hole in the Wall Gang. The story was so well known at the time that the article only needs to refer to him as "Tracy" and the nation knew who they were talking about. The back story is that Tracy had broken out of an Oregon state prison with another outlaw David Merrill (who was also Tracy's brother-in-law) and killed 5 guards in doing so. After crossing the Columbia, Tracy shot Merrill thinking that he had cut a deal to deliver Tracy to the law - it is probably Merrill's horse that the article mentions Tracy leading. He made it as far as Creston, Washington beyond the Snoqualmie Pass before he was pinned down by a posse in a wheat field on August 5. Shot in both legs and losing blood fast, Tracy put himself out of his misery with his Colt .45. He had been on the lam for 58 days and had killed 11 people along the way. Harry Tracy is buried in the Oregon State Penitentiary Cemetery in Salem where he doesn't seem to have made another escape.

Elsewhere, J.A. Bowen is *not* out of business and is still selling "the celebrated Pabst bottle beer", the "Texas Floods" are reeking havoc and the "situation no brighter", and the Frisco railway system has electric lights and fans to the "Northern resorts" where you can escape the flooding and just go fishin'. There was a gruesome murder of a sheep herder thought to have been done by rival cattle owners, Mr. Petmecky is in the phonograph business and he's "in it hard", and Germans must have been very predominant in Austin at the time where one is looking for a fresh "milch" cow and another is wanting to employ a German or Swedish girl for housework.

Stopping Forced Annexation - You Can Make A Difference

During the last legislative session, counties in Texas were designated as Tier 1 (less than 500,000 in population) and Tier 2 (greater than 500,000 in population) and the cities in a Tier 2 county can no longer force annex people's property into their city limits - the people get a chance to vote on being annexed or not. If a county is a Tier 1 (like Guadalupe), the cities in it can still forcibly annex properties, giving the annexed property owners no choice but to pay that city's property taxes and abide by their laws, and restrictions.

But there is a way to have a Tier 1 county designated as a Tier 2 and stop forced annexations. When 10% of the registered voters in the county sign a petition, the county must add a proposition to the next election that gives the citizens the chance to vote on changing the county to a Tier 2. Several counties in Texas have already had a petition drive to get the Tier 2 designation on the ballot and have voted with a **resounding** "Yes" - Parker, Wise, Johnson, Freestone, Palo Pinto, Ellis, and Atascosa. Many others, like Guadalupe, are now working to get that proposition on their next ballot.

The City of Kingsbury, by law and by conscience, only annexes when requested by the landowner. The city leaders do not believe in forced annexation and were some of the first to sign the petition to change Guadalupe county to a Tier 2. If you would also like to join the effort and sign a petition, you can contact Kingsbury City Commissioner Frank Ignasiak at (830) 433-1668 or Mayor Shirley Nolen at (830) 491-8863 or at 323-KINGSBURY. They can drop off and pick up petition sheets anywhere in the Kingsbury area. Curbside service!

The petitions have to be complete by February 8, 2019 to get on the May ballot. That's just
