Boo!

Halloween is this Thursday!

Halloween is an annual holiday, celebrated each year on October 31, that has roots in age-old European traditions. It originated with the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain, when people would light bonfires and wear costumes to ward off **ghosts**. In the eighth century, Pope Gregory III designated November 1st as a time to honor all saints; soon, All Saints Day incorporated some of the traditions of Samhain. The evening before was known as All Hallows Eve, and later Halloween.

Over time, Halloween evolved into a day of activities like trick-or-treating and carving jack-o-lanterns. Around the world, as days grow shorter and nights get colder, people continue to usher in the season with gatherings, costumes and sweet treats.



Big Boy Is Coming This Way!

Kingsbury was laid out by plat in 1875 when the railroad tracks finally arrived from the east and has been a railroad town ever since. The Galveston Harrisburg & San Antonio Railway that was built through here was part of the growing network of tracks off the **transcontinental** railroad that was completed in 1869.

Now, the Union Pacific Railroad is commemorating the 150th anniversary of that historic moment when the railroads of the east and west finally met. UP has restored a Big Boy locomotive and is touring the Southwest including a section through Kingsbury!

The Union Pacific Big Boy is a type of simple articulated 4-8-8-4 steam locomotive manufactured by the American Locomotive Company between 1941 and 1944 and operated by the Union Pacific Railroad in revenue service until 1959.

The 25 Big Boy locomotives were built to haul freight over the Wasatch mountains between Ogden, Utah, and Green River, Wyoming. In the late 1940s, they were reassigned to Cheyenne, Wyoming, where they hauled freight over Sherman Hill to Laramie, Wyoming. They were the only locomotives to use a 4-8-8-4 wheel arrangement: four-wheel leading truck for stability entering curves, two sets of eight driving wheels and a four-wheel trailing truck to support the large firebox.

Eight Big Boys survive, most on static display at museums across the country. One of them, No. 4014, was re-acquired by Union Pacific and restored to operating condition in 2019, regaining the title as the largest and most powerful operating steam locomotive in the world!

Now, Union Pacific's historic Big Boy steam locomotive No. 4014 is touring the Union Pacific system throughout 2019 to commemorate the transcontinental railroad's 150th anniversary.

The Big Boy's return to the rails is the product of more than two years of meticulous restoration work by the Union Pacific Steam Team. No. 4014 is the world's only operating Big Boy locomotive.

Big Boy 4014 is scheduled to leave San Antonio on November 6th at 8:00 am and arrive in Luling at 10:00 am for a 30 minute layover. This means it will be coming through Kingsbury shortly before it's arrival in Luling.

Won't it be a sight to see for a steam engine to come chugging it's way through Kingsbury?!

November

This Friday will be November 1st.

November is the eleventh and penultimate month of the year in the Julian and Gregorian Calendars and the fourth and last month to have the length of 30 days. November was the ninth month of the ancient Roman calendar. November retained its name (from the Latin *novem* meaning "nine") when January and February were added to the Roman calendar.

The zodiac signs for the month of November are Scorpio (October 23-November 21) and Sagittarius (November 22 – December 21).



The November birthstone, the topaz, symbolizes **love** and affection. It is believed to give the wearer increased strength and intellect.

November's birth flower is the chrysanthemum.

November Night Skies

The meteor showers that peak in the month of November are:



Taurid - Peak is November 9th with about 3 meteors per hour in the late evening.
Leonid - Peaks on November 17th and 18th with 10 meteors per hour in the pre-dawn hours
Andromedid - Peak is November 25-27 with about 5 meteors per hour in the late evenings.

Early voting continues this week for the upcoming November 5th elections. Here in Kingsbury, the election ballot will be all **statewide** propositions.

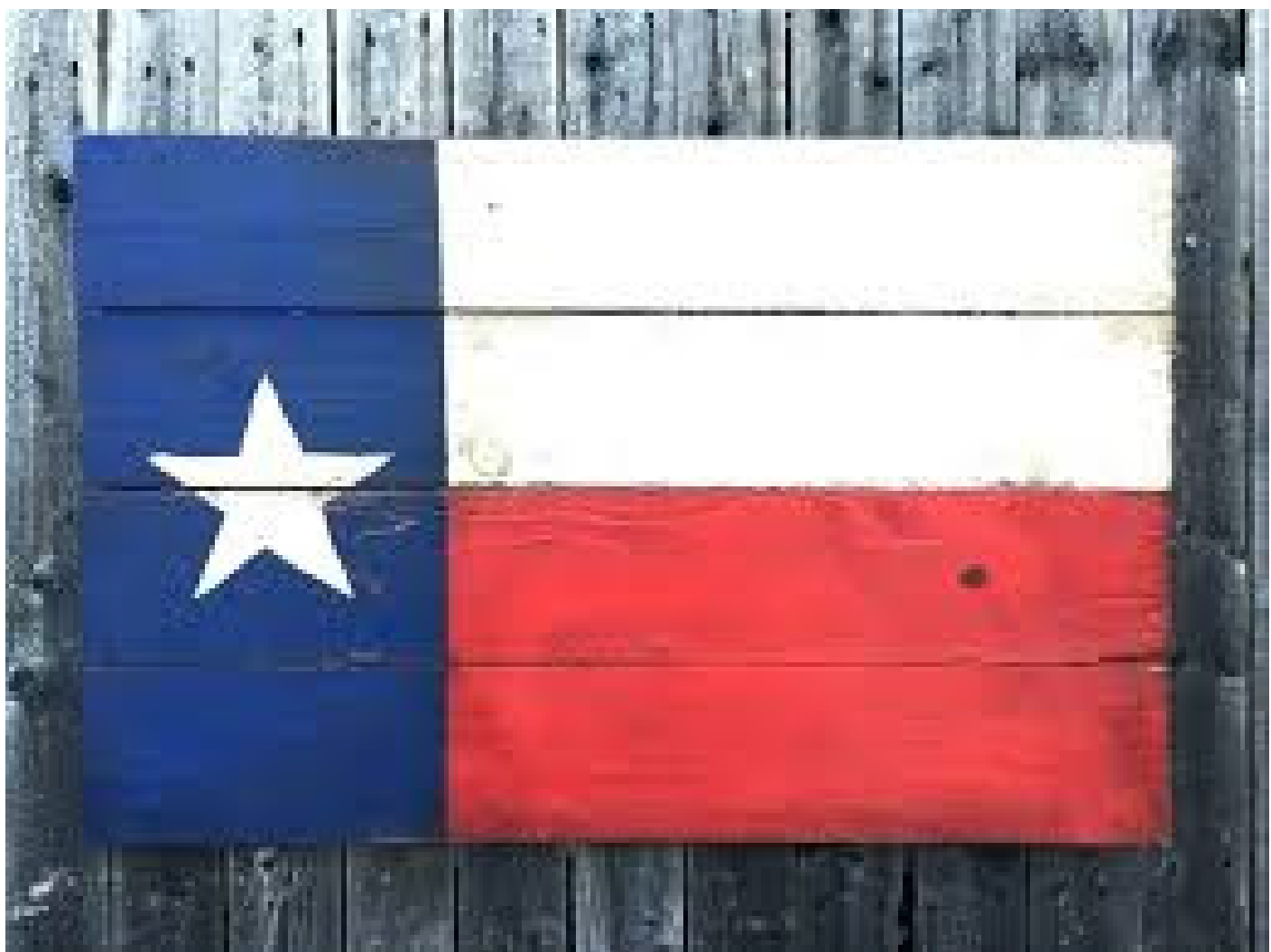
There is no early voting location in Kingsbury,

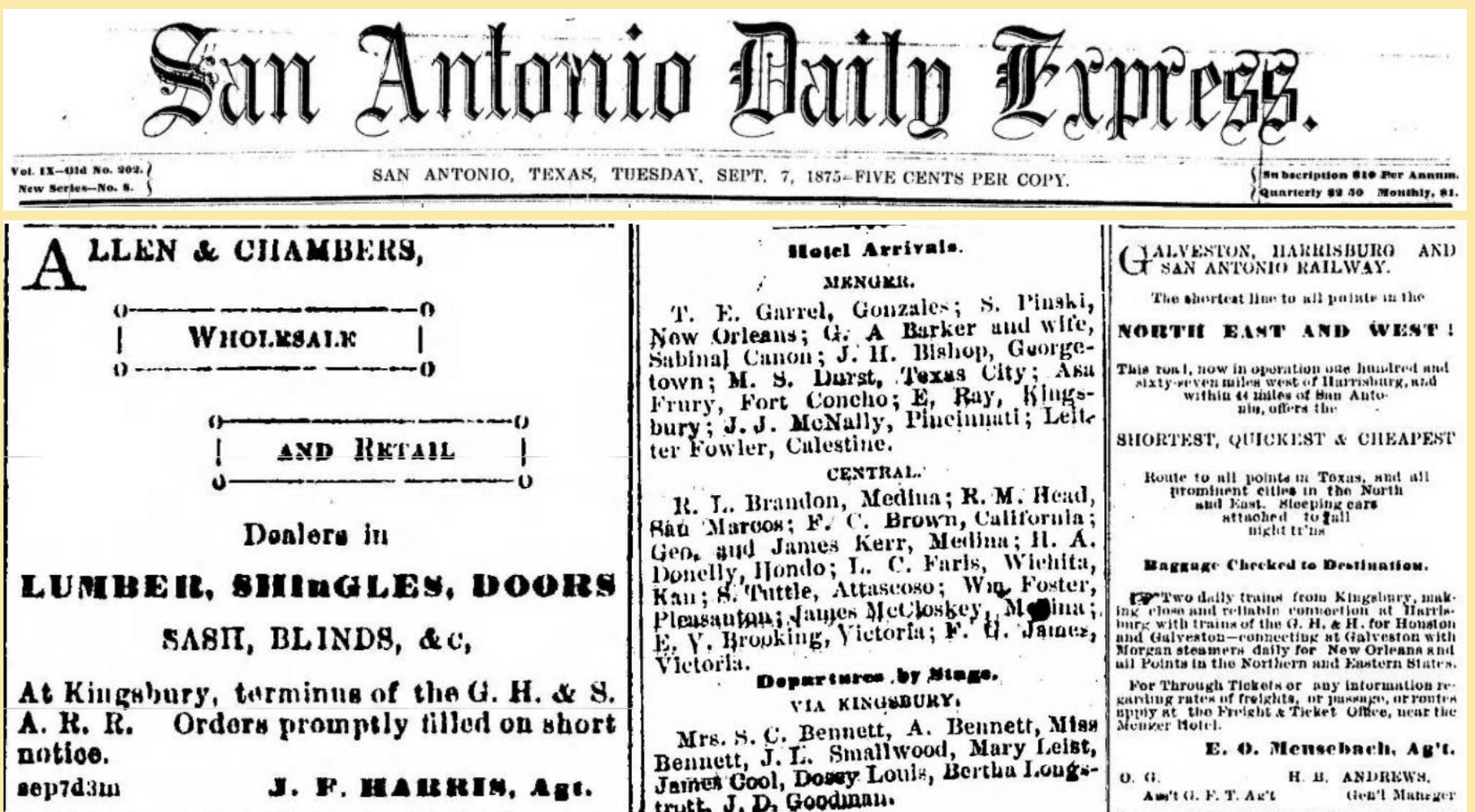


Kingsbury News Past

All the **news** that's fit to print about what *was* happening in Kingsbury . . .

The September 7, 1875 edition of the *San Antonio Daily Express* had several mentions of Kingsbury that day, all related in some way to the railroad being built that now extended as far west as the Kingsbury depot.

Allen & Chambers "At Kingsbury, terminus of the G.H. & S.A. R.R." has all your shingles and sash needs, E. Ray from Kingsbury was staying at the Menger Hotel, and a number of people departed on the Kingsbury stage coach, no doubt to pick up the train for points East. And E.O. Mensebach is letting you know that there are "two daily trains from Kingsbury" with the "shortest line to all points in the North East And West !"



Elsewhere in 1875, you can get your El Paso onion seed from S. Schutz & Bro., S.E. Butler is the agent for portable gas lights and Puroline fuel ("The best thing yet"), and there's a new ice factory where you can get "large or small quantities at two cents a pound." Sounds like a good deal!

You can get your Dodge reapers at L. Huth & Son, yellow fever is popping up again in New Orleans but the reporter has "spent twenty-five years on the yellow fever coast" (isn't that an awful name?!) and doesn't think there's going to be an epidemic this year, and you, too, can get a husband by having a "virtuous heart" and

The Business Guide lets you know where to go for Barber-Shops, confectioners (where you can get Pure Loaf Sugar Candy), fire arms, fruit stores, and "Hides and Produce" ("North side Cathedral, between the two Plazas"), and in New York, 222 train car loads of peaches just arrived. Holy cow that's a lot of peaches!!

YELLOW FEVER IN NEW ORLEANS.—A

private telegram received in St. Louis
states that six cases of yellow fever, with
three deaths, are known to have occurred
in New Orleans so far, this season. Such
rumors are every year, and are worth-
less till confirmed. We have spent twenty-
five years of the yellow fever coast, and
we believe epidemic will occur this
year.

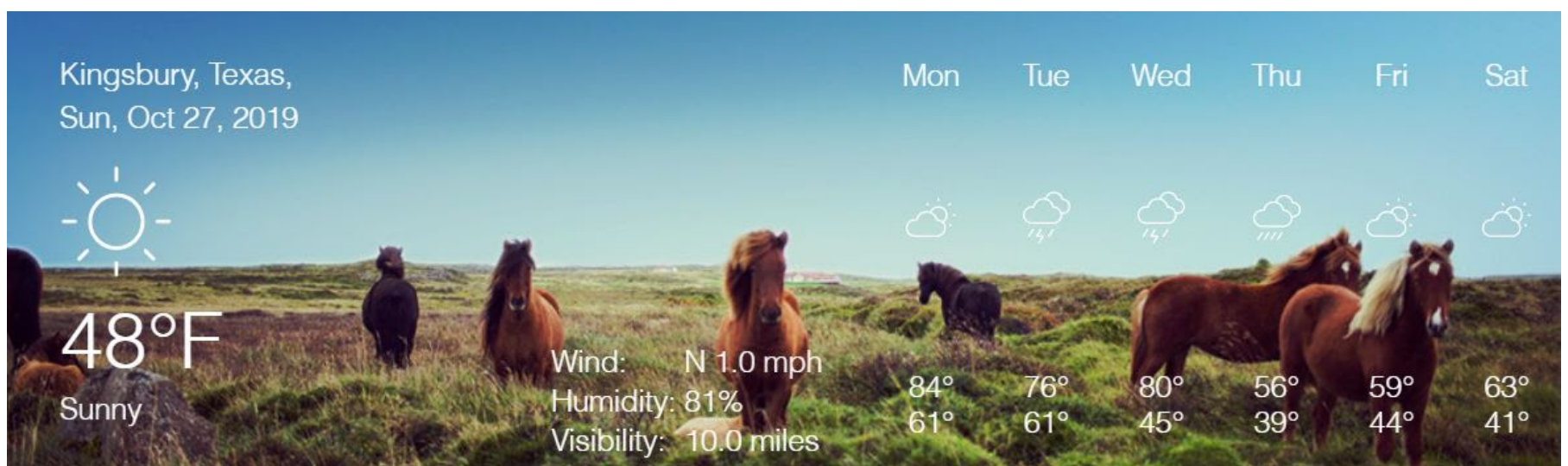

Boston. Yesterday 180 car loads
arrived for Jersey City and forty-
one for Boston.

Inez lived from 1905 to 1971 (and is buried in the Kingsbury Cemetery) so she must have been only about 24 years old in this picture - and loves her puppy!
