Here's the latest on what's going on in Kingsbury!

Full Harvest Super Blood Moon

This Tuesday, September 17th, at 9:35 pm Kingsbury time, the full moon known as the Full Harvest Moon will reach maximum. Moon watchers will get a special treat this month: September's full moon is also a supermoon, meaning it's slightly bigger and brighter than an average moon.

On top of all that, we will see a partial lunar eclipse here in Kingsbury and the moon will turn slightly red. That makes this a Full Harvest Super Blood Moon!

The penumbral eclipse will begin at 7:41 p.m. when the Earth's penumbra will start touching the face of the Moon. The partial eclipse will start at 9:12 p.m. and **skywatchers** may notice the moon turning red, with the maximum eclipse to begin at 9:44 p.m. The partial eclipse will end at 10:15 and the penumbral eclipse will end at 11:47 p.m.

September's full moon is the Full Corn moon. This year, the September full Moon is called the Harvest Moon. Unlike other full Moon names, which are specific to their respective months, the Harvest Moon is tied to an astronomical event: the autumnal equinox. The full Moon that falls nearest to the equinox (September 22nd this year) takes on the name "Harvest Moon," rather than its traditional name. (This means that a Harvest Moon could occur in either September or October.)

The Harvest Moon provides the most light at the time when it's needed most—to complete the harvest!

The September full Moon was the Full Corn Moon because it traditionally corresponded with the time of harvesting corn. It was also called the Barley Moon, as this is the time to harvest and thresh ripened barley.

The Friday Morning, September 1, 1876 edition of the *San Antonio Express* had a gripe with the "mail agent" on the GH&SA (Galveston, Harrisburg & San Antonio) railroad "between Harrisburg and Kingsbury or Seguin, or whatever the terminus may be". During this time the end of the railroad was still moving west as the rails and bridges were being built which apparently caused some confusion on exactly where the terminus was. Regardless, there "was no failure of connection by the trains" and yet the mail has not arrived on "two occasions". In 1876, mail was extremely important and two misses was a big deal!

MAIL COMPLAINT.—The Gonzales Index says that the mail agent on the G. H. & S. A. R. R. R. between Harrisburg and Kingsbury or Seguin, or whatever the terminus may be, is complained of by the citizens of that place and vicinity for allegged negligences in the discharge of his duties. The mails for that place have failed to arrive on two occasions, recently, when there was no failure of connection by the trains.

In other 1876 news, there was a big shoot-out in a theatre in Brackett (now Brackettville) when "a party of men from the Nueces river" started using "insulting language to all the ladies in the house" (that will simply not be tolerated in Brackett!), there was a misunderstanding of being rested vs. arrested but what I don't understand is why the father then "ordered up mint sticks for the family", and Prof. C.F. Cheesman is reopening his Dancing Academy on September 15th (148 years ago today!).

Also in 1876, the buffalo have all but disappeared from Texas, the Gonzales newspapers, the *Inquirer* and the *Index*, merged but "both parties were dissatisfied" and have since separated into two papers again (fyi - the *Gonzales Inquirer* is the oldest continually-operated Hometown weekly newspaper in Texas), and flour "Introduced into this market in 1866" is "Another Victory!".

Elsewhere in 1876 news, robber Albert Dean was shot ("the ball having passed through his lungs") and captured down the road in Harwood and now charged with murder after a member of the posse was killed, and under "All Sorts" where are quite a few snippets of wisdom including "The extreme height of misery is a small boy with a new pair of boots and no mud puddle" (oh what a misery that is indeed!).

Row at Brackett.

Free Use of Fire-arms with but Little Damage.

Special to the Express.]

Brackett, August 31, 1876.

A party of men from the Nurces river attending a theatre at this place last night, became disorderly, and at about half-past eleven o'clock commenced talking in loud and insulting language to all the ladies in the house, when a Mr. Robinson, a citizen of this place remonstrated. One of the introders pulled his pistol and fired at Robinson. The ball missed him, but the powder from the cartridge burned his eye severely, the pistol being to close to his face. Rubinson then knocked the man down before he could fire again, when all the party commenced firing at Robinson, who then pulled his revolver and returned the fire, and drove the party off. One of the party is supposed to be badly wounded.

'Papa,' said a little one to her sire, 'you were rested last night, weren't you?' 'No, my dear, papa never did anything to be arrested for.' 'Why, you slept all night; didn't that rest you?' The 'old man' caved, and ordered up mint sticks for the family.

THE HARWOOD TRAGEDY .- The Gonzales Index says that Albert Dean, one of the parties captured in the late fight at Harwood with the sheriff's posse in which Nave, one of the posse, and Edward Parker or Wilson, one of the robbors, were killed, had a preliminary examination before Justice W. V. Collins on Thursday of last week, and was remanded to jail, bail having been denied him. The evidence was deemed sufficient by the Justice to warrant his being held on the charge of murder. Wilson, who was wounded and captured at the time, is slowly recovering. His wounds were much more serious than first reported, the ball having passed through his lungs.







Fall Fly-In



Gander Slough, Texas

A picture of Gander Slu, Texas, near Kingsbury and Sullivan in eastern Guadalupe County in 1923. Gander Slu was from 1859 to 1866 the site of a post office called Barrowsdale, after Dr. Leonard Barrow. Oil was discovered in the area in 1922 and Sullivan became a loading site for oil tank railroad cars. The landowner, a Mr. Allen,

suggested the name Allensville for the community that grew up around the oilfield, but one of the workers suggested "Gander Slough," a play on the name of the Goose Creek oilfield near Baytown. The worker put up a sign with the spelling "Slu."

The population was twenty-five in 1945, when the **settlement** included a few houses, a cemetery, and oil pumps. Gander Slu was not shown on county highway maps in 1987.

In the picture, one of the buildings on the left appears to be a big tent instead of a hard-sided structure. The road in front of it and the OK Cafe is an ugly, sloppy mess! And there are about as many gasoline-powered vehicles trying to traverse the mud as there are horse and mule carts.

I think the horses and mules probably won the war with the mud that day!
