
That says it all, doesn't it?!

Washington Crosses The Deleware

This week in history in 1776, during the American Revolution, Patriot General George Washington crosses the Delaware River with 5,400 troops, hoping to surprise a Hessian force celebrating Christmas at their winter quarters in Trenton, New Jersey. The unconventional attack came after several months of substantial defeats for Washington's army that had resulted in the loss of New York City and other strategic points in the region.

At about 11 p.m. on Christmas Day, Washington's army commenced its crossing of the **half-frozen** river at three locations. The 2,400 soldiers led by Washington successfully braved the icy and freezing river and reached the New Jersey side of the Delaware just before dawn. The other two divisions, made up of some 3,000 men and crucial artillery, failed to reach the meeting point at the appointed time.

At approximately 8 a.m. on the morning of December 26, Washington's remaining force, separated into two columns, reached the outskirts of Trenton and descended on the unsuspecting Hessians. Trenton's 1,400 Hessian defenders were groggy from the previous evening's festivities and underestimated the Patriot threat after months of decisive British victories throughout New York. Washington's men quickly overwhelmed the Germans' defenses, and by 9:30 a.m. the town was surrounded. Although several hundred Hessians escaped, nearly 1,000 were captured at the cost of only four American lives. However, because most of Washington's army had failed to cross the Delaware, he was without adequate artillery or men and was forced to withdraw from the town.

The victory was not particularly significant from a strategic point of view, but news of Washington's initiative raised the spirits of the American colonists, who previously feared that the Continental Army was incapable of victory.



Volunteer Work Days at Pioneer Flight Museum


Kingsbury News Past


All the **news** that's fit to print about what was happening in Kingsbury . . .

The October 2, 1875 edition of the *San Antonio Daily Express* had several mentions of Kingsbury in ads that have appeared a number of times in 1875. The Galveston Harrisburg & San Antonio Railroad only reached as far west as Kingsbury in 1875 so it was mentioned quite regularly in the S.A. and Galveston papers.



This day in 1875, Chas. Bender is letting the readers know that Texas Lumber Manufacturers has dissolved but he will continue business at Kingsbury and keep people "supplied with Texas and Calcasieu" lumber and shingles, Allen & Chambers are "dealers in lumber" in Kingsbury (perhaps the same Allen named in not so good a way in the Bender ad?), the G.H.&S.A. railroad still has "two daily trains from Kingsbury", and the Finucane Line stage coach line has "fare reduced and speed increased" from "San Antonio to Kingsbury".





Elsewhere in 1875, Th. Schleuning has "Northern Lard" and "Prime and choice Molasses" (molasses seems to be a big thing back in the day), get your "corns cured" and your "inverted toe-nails" fixed (I'm not even sure what that is!) at "Central Hotel Barber Shop" (the barber shop?!) and there were quite a few arrivals and departures on the Kingsbury stage.

In New York, the "season of equinoctial storms is at hand" (ones that happen around the fall equinox - now we just call it hurricane season) and there are a hundred viewing stations on the Atlantic coast with officers posted watching the weather. In particular, the New York station is watching the "formidable cyclone" that had hit the

Texas coast a few days earlier (now known as the 1875 Indianola Hurricane) which is apparently heading north. In other news, "popular young gentleman" Mr. Loeb is in town from Fort Concho (once a military and cavalry post near San Angelo), Miss Sommers is a "beautiful little terpsichorean artist" (had to look that one up - that's a very fancy way of saying she's a dancer), a small family wants a German girl to cook and wash, and the Menger Hotel sitting-room is getting cleaned (big news in 1875!). "Fat John" the barber keeps showing up in these old S.A. papers - he must have been quite the character! He was "well-corporated" (not sure what that means) and was so well-loved that the paper states "May he live long and prosper". And the Feed Stable has "first-class hostlers" and also keeps an "ambulance" to "carry passengers to any point". I think "ambulance" here just meant a carriage that could take you wherever you needed to go.

It is shadowed forth in the fellowing extract from an article in the New York Herald, of September 20th, in which the reporter gives an account of his visit to the weather signal station, on the top of the Equitable Building, Broadway, New York, with the views of the officers stationed there.

The season of equinoctial storms is at hand, and from now nutil the middle of October, we may look for fearful gales on land and sea. A cyclone has already started on its travels, over the usual path so accurately laid down by the Meteorological department of the weather signal service."

"The science of Meteorology has, within the past twenty years, been brought to a high pitch of perfection, and its study, as illustrating the wonderful and unalterable laws that govern the physical system of the universe, possessos as great an interest as any within the range of human knowledge."

"At this moment, a hundred stations of the weather signal service are watching the vagaries and progress of the formidable cyclone, that starting from the Southern coast of Cuba, nine or ten days ago, struck, and almost overwhelmed the city of Galveston, in Texas, last Wednesday morning."


