Kingsbury Road closed from FM 20 to Prairie Lee Road







US Flag Waves On Texas Soil

This week in Texas history, on July 26th, 1845, the United States flag is said to have been raised on St. Joseph Island by United States troops. This was the first time the U.S. flag was flown in Texas.

On July 23, 1845 Brigadier General Zachary Taylor, commander of the U.S. Army of Occupation, left New Orleans on the steamer Alabama with eight companies of the Third Infantry. His orders were to proceed to Texas and wait there until the Texas Convention had accepted the annexation resolution of the U.S. Congress. He was then to proceed immediately with his whole command to the western border of Texas, take up a position on or near the Rio Grande, and expel any Mexican force that attempted to cross into Texas.

On July 25, the Alabama dropped anchor off St. Joseph Island, a few miles north of the pass into Aransas Bay near the mouth of the Nueces River. By the following evening, three companies of troops had landed, and a small U.S. flag was flying from the top of a **sandhill**—the first ever raised by United States authority in Texas.

On July 29, Taylor attempted to take two companies of men with him to the mainland in the lighter Undine, but water in the Bay was low and the lighter ran aground after going but a few miles. There the General and his men stayed until sundown, August 1, when they were transferred to the Texas mainland in fishing boats that had gathered about the grounded lighter.

General Taylor and his men are believed to have camped beneath a massive live oak (at the site of present-day Rockport) until his return to St. Joseph Island and his subsequent successful trip to Corpus Christi in September.

The tree is now known as the Zachary Taylor Oak.

As with every other tree in the Rockport area, the Zachary Taylor tree was badly damaged by Hurricane Harvey, but the city of Rockport has been working to save this historic tree.

Everyone is welcome!




Kingsbury City Limits

Full Buck Dog Days Moon

Tonight is the full moon in July known as the the Full Buck Moon. At this time, a buck's antlers are in full growth mode. This Full Moon was also known as the Thunder Moon because **thunderstorms** are so frequent during this month.

This July full moon is also begins the Dog Days of Summer. According to The Old Farmer's Almanac, the Dog Days of summer are traditionally the 40 days beginning July 3 and ending August 11, which coincide with the dawn rising of the Sirius, the Dog Star, which Greek and Roman astrology connected with heat, drought, sudden thunderstorms, lethargy, fever, mad dogs, and bad luck.

- On July 20, 1969, Neil Armstrong became the first person to step foot on the Moon. He also placed the U.S. flag there.
 - On July 31, 1999, the ashes of astrogeologist Eugene Shoemaker were deposited on the Moon.

Based on the moon phase for the rest of July, these are the best days for these activities:

July 19, 20 - set posts or pour concrete
July 20 - end projects
July 21, 22 - castrate animals

July 23, 24 - can or pickle vegetables and fruit, make jams or jellies, make sauerkraut, plant belowground crops
July 25-27 - destroy pests and weeds, dry fruit, vegetables, or meat, prune to discourage grouth
July 25, 30 - begin a diet to lose weight, quit smoking, wean animals or children
July 28, 29 - cut hair to discourage growth, color hair, harvest belowground crops

1918 Oil Field

This is an awesome picture of the very early days of oil production in the Kingsbury area.

The year is 1918 and the men are drilling a new well with an already standing derrick in the background. There is also a woman in the picture standing next to the giant **flywheel** to the left. The gentleman in the middle is wearing those knee-high leather boots that so many workers used in the oil fields.

Other men are unloading items from the wagon where the horse is standing patiently by. It looks like he had to pull that wagon through some pretty muddy ground based on the state of those wagon wheels!

I'm not sure, but the man standing next to the drilling machine may be the law. He appears to have a patch on his sleeve and a gun on his hip. Hard to tell exactly from a picture that is 106 years old!
