
Here's the latest on what's going on in Kingsbury!

Full Flower Super Blood Moon

This Wednesday, May 26th, is the full moon known as the Full Flower Moon.

This full Moon will be the closest full Moon of the year, making it the second of two supermoons—don't miss it! Plus, it will coincide with a total lunar eclipse making it a "Blood Moon" too! (see "Blood Moon" section below)

We use Full Moon names that were used during Native American and Colonial times to help track the seasons. Depending on the tribe, May's Full Moon was called the Full Flower Moon as well as Mother's Moon, Milk Moon, and Corn Planting Moon. The May Moon marked a time of increasing fertility, with temperatures warm enough for safely bearing young, a near end to late frosts, and plants in bloom.

The fool moon in May got the name "Flower Moon" because flowers spring forth in **abundance** this month. The name Milk Moon may come from the fact that May is a time when so many animals bear and begin nursing their young. But cows would not have been included with that group as they are not native to the Americas.

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The Ontario Native Literacy Coalition notes that while the Ojibwe tribes of the Great Lakes area called the May full moon a Flower Moon ("Waawaaskone Giizis"), people of the Cree Nation in northern Montana and parts of Canada named it the Frog Moon because this was the time of year frogs became active.

Although many Native American tribes gave distinct names to the full moon, the most well known full moon names come from the Algonquin tribes who lived in the area of New England and westward to Lake Superior. The Algonquin tribes had perhaps the greatest effect on the early European settlers in America, and the settlers adopted the Native American habit of naming the full moons.

As with all full moons, the one in May goes by many names:

Sioux - Moon When the Ponies Shed
Shawnee - Strawberry Moon
Mohawk - Time of Big Leaf Moon
Hopi - Moon of Waiting
Cree - Frog Moon
Choctaw - Moon of Mulberry and Panther Moon
Cherokee - Planting Moon
Apache - Season When the Leaves Are Green Moon
Algonquin - Moon When Women Weed Corn
Chippewa - Blossom Moon
Arapaho - Moon When the Ponies Shed Their Shaggy Hair
Cheyenne - Moon When the Horses Get Fat
Comanche - Flower Moon
Lakota - Moon of the Green Leaves
Shoshone - Budding Moon

Colonial American - Milk Moon Chinese - Dragon Moon Celtic - Bright Moon Medieval English - Hare Moon Neo Pagan - Grass Moon

Often the moon will look a bit redder in the Northern Hemisphere during warmer months, as the moonlight has to travel through more atmosphere to reach one's eyes. The best times for these effects are usually near the rising and setting times.

All the **news** that's fit to print about what was happening in Kingsbury ...



The April 8, 1876 edition of the *San Antonio Express* had an item about the Kingsbury stage coming in early *again* an maybe trying to show up the "Locomotive." At that time, the railroad only came as far west as Kingsbury where travelers would then have to take the stage to go any farther.


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
The Kingsbury stage was in early again last evening. The Railroad must be coming nearer to us, or else the horses belonging to the State line, are trying to make the Locomotive ashamed of himself.

In other 1876 news, the San Antonio photographers will copy your "old pictures" (if this was 1876, how old was "old" at the time?!), Pentenrieder & Co.'s "Successor" has fishing tackle and music boxes (what a combo!), R.M. Harkess has "dry goods" in Frio City (previously Frio Town and now just a ghost town northwest of Pearsall), and A. Nette the apothecary has your regular drugs and medicines but also "perfumeries" and "surgical instruments" (in case you needed to smell good while using a scalpel).

Also "General" Cooking Stoves won the First Premium award six years in row (1869-1874), C. Bain & Co. has "Four-Horse Coaches" to multiple points that are now ghost towns including "Fort CONCHO" near San Angelo that was abandoned in 1889 (and it only took "57 hours" to get there!), and the G.H.&S.A. railroad has "Two daily trains from Kingsbury".

Elsewhere in 1876, E.B. Wetzstein is a Druggist that has similar items to the previous Apothecary but also has "Chemicals" (what kind of chemicals that would be is a mystery), A Chinese man-of-war ship christened by the "heathen Chinese" as *The Terror to Western Nations* has so many problems it is obviously "bedeviled" and now they have to wait till "the devils leave her", and the *Duchess Farmer* has an "entirely successful" way to preserve butter with its "fresh, rosy flavor". I'd have trouble with my butter since it starts with "three gallons of brine strong enough to bear an egg" and I'm not even sure what that means!

A CHINESE MAN-OF-WAR.

BRINE THAT WILL PRESERVE BUTTER A YEAR.

Among the many devices for keeping butter in a manner that preserves the fresh, rosy flavor of new, with all its sweetness, 18 the following from the Buchess Farmer, which is said to be entirely successful:

To three gallons of brine strong enough to bear an egg, add a quarter of a pound of nice white sugar and a tenspoonful of saltpeter. Boil the brine, and, when it is cold, strain carefully. Make your butter into rolls, and wrap each separately in a clean white muslin cloth, tying up with a string. Pack a large jar full, weigh the butter down and pour on the brine until all of it is submerged. This will keep really good butter perfectly sweet and fresh for a whole year. Be careful not to put upon ice butter you wish to keep any length of time. In summer, when the heat will not admit of the butter being made into rolls, pack it closely into small jars, and, using the same brine, allow it to cover the butter to the depth of four inches. This excludes the air, and answers nearly as well as the first method suggested.—Ex.

UM AGRICULTURAL AND MECHANICAL PAIR

This month's full Moon coincides with a total lunar eclipse! A lunar eclipse occurs when Earth stands directly between the Moon and the Sun, which results in Earth casting its shadow on the Moon. During a *total* lunar eclipse, the Moon is fully obscured by Earth's shadow, giving the Moon a reddish hue. This phenomenon is where the term "blood moon" comes from.

This total lunar eclipse occurs in the **pre-dawn** hours of May 26 and will only be visible for stargazers in western North America, western South America, eastern Asia, and Oceania. In the U.S., those who are located east of the Mississippi will experience a partial lunar eclipse before the Moon sets below the horizon, and those along the East Coast won't see much of anything, unfortunately. Because the Moon will be so low in the sky during the eclipse, you'll need to find a high vantage point with a clear view of the horizon.

Here in Kingsbury, we will miss part of the partial and penumbral phases (the moon will be below the horizon at that point) but the entire total phase will be visible!

The Moon will enter the outer edge of Earth's shadow (called the "penumbra") at 3:47 A.M. and reach the darkest part of its shadow (the "umbra") at 4:44 A.M.

Penumbral Eclipse begins: May 26, 3:47:39 am
Partial Eclipse begins: 4:44:58 am
Full Eclipse begins: 6:11:26 am
Maximum Eclipse: 6:18:42 am
Full Eclipse ends 6:25:54 am.
