


# **Kingsbury City Limits**

# **Here Comes May**

Tomorrow is the first day of the month of May.

May is the fifth month of the year in the Julian and Gregorian Calendars and the third month to have the length of 31 days. May is also the month with the shortest name.

The month 'may' have been named for the Greek goddess *Maia*, who was identified with the Roman goddess of fertility, *Bona Dea*, whose festival was held in May. The **Roman** poet Ovid had another idea: May, he said, was named for the *maiores* (the elders) and June for the *iuniores* (youth).

The May birth flowers are the lily of the valley and the hawthorn plant.



The fragrant lily of the valley signifies sweetness, humility, and a return to happiness. If you want to show your loved one that your life is complete with them, give them a few lilies of the valley.



The other May flower is the hawthorn plant, which represents hope and supreme happiness.

Hawthorn signifies that you want only the best for the recipient.

### May Birthstone - Facts & Folklore

The May birthstone, the emerald, was a favorite gem of Cleopatra and Catherine the Great.



It has long been associated with fertility, rebirth, and love.

Emeralds, like aquamarine, are a form of the mineral beryl. In the 1700s, powdered emeralds were sold by chemists to help relieve pain.

Today, it is thought that emeralds signify wisdom, growth, and patience.

Wearing an emerald may help to strengthen your memory. If you dream of buying an emerald, someone you trust may deceive you.

The Eta Aquariids meteor shower appears in May. It is visible from about April 19 to about May 26 this year with peak activity on May 6 at 9:30 pm Kingsbury time.



# **Kentucky Derby**

Next Saturday, May 6th, is the 149th running of the Kentucky Derby - "the most exciting two minutes in sports."

The Kentucky Derby is the oldest continuously run sporting event in the nation and the most wagered-upon race in the world. Though a few other races began before the Derby, there were years when they weren't run. The Kentucky Derby has been run each year since 1875. Since the race is only open to 3-year-olds, each horse only gets one shot at the roses in his or her lifetime.

The current favorites are Tappit Trice, Kingsbarns, Forte, and, once again, Kingsbury's own Donkey Hotie.

We tell Donkey Hotie that that he's running every year, but as always he's a **lover**, not a racer!



## **Full Flower Moon**

This Friday, May 5th, is the full moon known as the Full Flower Moon.

We use Full Moon names that were used during Native American and Colonial times to help track the seasons. Depending on the tribe, May's Full Moon was called the Full Flower Moon as well as Mother's Moon, Milk Moon, and Corn Planting Moon. The May Moon marked a time of increasing fertility, with temperatures warm enough for safely bearing young, a near end to late frosts, and plants in bloom.

The fool moon in May got the name "Flower Moon" because flowers spring forth in abundance this month. The name Milk Moon may come from the fact that May is a time when so many animals bear and begin **nursing** their young. But cows would not have been included with that group as they are not native to the Americas.

The Ontario Native Literacy Coalition notes that while the Ojibwe tribes of the Great Lakes area called the May full moon a Flower Moon ("Waawaaskone Giizis"), people of the Cree Nation in northern Montana and parts of Canada named it the Frog Moon because this was the time of year frogs became active.

Although many Native American tribes gave distinct names to the full moon, the most well known full moon names come from the Algonquin tribes who lived in the area of New England and westward to Lake Superior. The Algonquin tribes had perhaps the greatest effect on the early European settlers in America, and the settlers adopted the Native American habit of naming the full moons.

As with all full moons, the one in May goes by many names:

Sioux - Moon When the Ponies Shed
Shawnee - Strawberry Moon
Mohawk - Time of Big Leaf Moon
Hopi - Moon of Waiting
Cree - Frog Moon
Choctaw - Moon of Mulberry and Panther Moon
Cherokee - Planting Moon
Apache - Season When the Leaves Are Green Moon
Winnebago - Hoeing-Corn Moon

Algonquin - Moon When Women Weed Corn
Chippewa - Blossom Moon
Arapaho - Moon When the Ponies Shed Their Shaggy Hair
Shoshone - Budding Moon
Cheyenne - Moon When the Horses Get Fat
Comanche - Flower Moon
Lakota - Moon of the Green Leaves
Creek - Mulberry Moon
Zuni - No Name Moon

Colonial American - Milk Moon Chinese - Dragon Moon Celtic - Bright Moon Medieval English - Hare Moon Neo Pagan - Grass Moon

Often the moon will look a bit redder in the Northern Hemisphere during warmer months, as the moonlight has to travel through more atmosphere to reach one's eyes. The best times for these effects are usually near the rising and setting times.


## **Kingsbury VFD and Auxiliary**


Stop by to learn what you can do to help your community as a firefighter, a supporter, or as a first-responder.



Mr. Lynch owned a mercantile business in town on Railway Street around where the county warehouse is today.

The people in the photos are Lynch family members. The picture with the kids on the horse has a baby in a **pram** on the right with the girls in huge, wonderful hats - just click on the pictures to enlarge and check out everything that is going on in the photos.
