Here's the latest on what's going on in Kingsbury!

Road Work

You may have seen the sign on Kingsbury Road to expect traffic delays starting Monday, August 11th.

According to Guadalupe County Road & Bridge, work will begin Monday to "level up" the roadway beginning on the north end of Kingsbury Road near FM 20 and moving south.

The road will not be closed, but we can expect long delays where the crews are working. The work will take several days to complete.



Perseid Meteors Peak!

The annual Perseid meteor shower is one of the most beloved meteor showers of the year, especially in the Northern Hemisphere, where the shower peaks on warm summer nights. No matter where you live worldwide, the 2025 Perseid meteor shower will probably produce the greatest number of meteors on the mornings of August 12 and 13. Since we just had the Full Sturgeon Moon on Saturday, the moon will be still near full (88.8% full) and will drown out some Perseids from view after moonrise at 10:24 pm on August 12th. Try and catch a few before the moon gets high in the night sky!

People tend to focus on the peak mornings of meteor showers, and that's entirely appropriate. But meteors in annual showers – which come from streams of debris left behind in space by comets – typically last weeks, not days. Perseid meteors have been streaking across our skies since around July 17. We'll see Perseids for 10 days or so after the peak mornings on August 12 and 13.

Also remember, the the Delta Aquariid and Alpha Capricornid meteor showers are still rambling along steadily. You'll see mostly Perseids, but also some others in the mix. The Perseids are active from July 17 to August 24. They reach a strong maximum on August 11-12 this year. Normal rates seen from rural locations range from 50-75 shower members per hour at maximum. The Perseids are particles released from comet 109P/Swift-Tuttle during its numerous returns to the inner solar system.

In a typical year, although the meteor numbers increase after midnight, the Perseid meteors still start to fly at mid-to-late evening from northerly latitudes. If fortune smiles upon you, the evening hours might offer you an earthgrazer – a looooong, slow, colorful meteor traveling horizontally across the evening sky. Earthgrazer meteors are rare but memorable. Perseid earthgrazers appear before midnight, when the radiant point of the shower is close to the horizon.

General rules for Perseid-watching. No special equipment, or knowledge of the constellations, needed.

Find a dark, open sky to enjoy the show. An open sky is essential because these meteors fly across the sky in many different directions and in front of numerous constellations.

Give yourself at least an hour of observing time, because the meteors in meteor showers come in spurts and are interspersed with lulls. Remember, your eyes can take as long as 20 minutes to adapt to the darkness of night.

So don't rush the process.


Know that the meteors all come from a single point in the sky. If you trace the paths of the Perseid meteors backwards, you'd find they all come from a point in front of the constellation Perseus. Don't worry about which stars are Perseus. Just enjoying knowing and observing that they all come from one place on the sky's dome.

Avoid looking at your phone and other light sources. Look for the darkest area of the sky. Keep the moon out of your line of sight as best you can.

Enjoy the comfort of a reclining lawn chair. Bring along some other things you might enjoy also, like a thermos filled with a hot drink.

Remember ... all good things come to those who wait. Meteors are part of nature. There's no way to predict exactly how many you'll see on any given night. Find a good spot, watch, wait.

You'll see some!


























Kingsbury Weather




Kingsbury City Limits

London Learns Of American Independence

This week in American history, on August 10, 1776, news finally reaches London that the Americans had drafted the Declaration of Independence.

Until the Declaration of Independence formally transformed the 13 British colonies into states, both Americans and the British saw the conflict centered in Massachusetts as a local uprising within the British empire. To King George III, it was a colonial **rebellion**, and to the Americans, it was a struggle for their rights as British citizens. However, when Parliament continued to oppose any reform and remained unwilling to negotiate with the American rebels and instead hired Hessians, German mercenaries, to help the British army crush the rebellion, the Continental Congress began to pass measures abolishing British authority in the colonies.

In January 1776, Thomas Paine published Common Sense, an influential political pamphlet that convincingly argued for American independence from the British monarchy. It sold more than 500,000 copies in just a few months. By the spring of 1776, support for independence had swept through the colonies, the Continental Congress called for states to form their own governments and a five-man committee was assigned to draft a

document declaring independence from the British king.

The Declaration of Independence was largely the work of Virginian Thomas Jefferson. In justifying American independence, Jefferson drew generously from the political philosophy of John Locke, an advocate of natural rights, and from the work of other British theorists. The declaration features the immortal lines "We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness." It then goes on to present a long list of grievances that provided the American rationale for rebellion.

In every stage of these Oppressions we have Petitioned for Redress in the most humble Terms: Our repeated Petitions have been answered only by repeated Injury. A Prince, whose Character is thus marked by every act which may define a Tyrant, is unfit to be the Ruler of a free People.

No a have we been wanting in Attentions to our British Brethren. We have varied them from Time to Time of Attempts by their Legislature to extend an unwarrantable Jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the Circumstances of our Emigration and Settlement here. We have appealed to their native Justice and Magnanimity, and we have conjured them of the Circumstances of our Emigration and Settlement here. Application For Place On Ballot

There are two seats on the Kingsbury City Commission that are up for **election** in November - mayor and one city commission member.

Anyone filing for a place on the ballot must:

- Be a U.S. citizen
- Be a Texas resident 12 months prior to the filing deadline
- Be a resident within the Kingsbury city limits for at least 6 months prior to the filing deadline
- Be registered to vote in Kingsbury by the filing deadline
- Be at least 18 years of age

The filing period runs from July 19th to August 18th at 5:00 pm.

Applications and a drop box are available 24/7 on the outside message board at the Fire Station #1 (1060 FM 1104, Kingsbury).

Hurricane Alicia

Hurricane Alicia forms south of Louisiana in the Gulf of Mexico this week in Texas history on August 15, 1983. Three days later, the Texas Gulf Coast is slammed by the storm, causing 21 deaths, thousands of injuries and billions of dollars in damages.

When Alicia hit Galveston, Texas, it was the first hurricane to hit the United States in three years. It was a Category 3 hurricane, with sustained winds of nearly 100 mph and gusts up to 127 mph. The town of Seabrook on Galveston Bay endured a 12-foot storm surge and an 11-foot tide completely submerged buildings in the Brownwood development. Alicia also dropped **prodigious** amounts of rain on the area. Houston received 11 inches in a short period of time. Fortunately, Alicia moved so fast that inland areas did not suffer deadly flooding.

Hurricane Alicia also set off many tornadoes in southeast Texas. Fourteen were reported between Galveston and Houston in one day. In Houston, window panes on skyscrapers were broken by flying debris, unleashing flying shards of glass into the air over the downtown area. On the second day, nine more tornadoes were reported north of Houston.

In addition to the 21 people who lost their lives in the storms, 3,000 homes suffered severe damage and thousands of people required shelter assistance from the Red Cross. The \$2 billion in damages recorded was a record for hurricane damage in Texas at the time. The environmental costs were also staggering. Thousands of trees were blown down. Galveston's West Beach lost 150 feet of sand to sudden erosion from the storm. For the most part, though, Galveston's seawall successfully protected the city. Afterwards, the Army Corps of Engineers estimated that without it, much of the city would have been destroyed.
