Here's the latest on what's going on in Kingsbury!

Daylight Saving Time Ends

Daylight Saving Time 2019 ended today, Sunday, November 1st at 2:00 a.m.

Hopefully, before you went to bed on Saturday night, you remembered to "fall back" by setting your clocks back one hour. The exceptions are Arizona, Hawaii, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, and American Samoa.


Credit for Daylight Saving Time belongs to Benjamin Franklin, who first suggested the idea in 1784. The idea was revived in 1907, when William Willett, an Englishman, proposed a similar system in the pamphlet *The Waste of Daylight*. The Germans were the first to officially adopt the light-extending system in 1915 as a fuel-saving measure during World War I. The British switched one year later, and the United States followed in 1918, when Congress passed the Standard Time Act, which established our time zones. This experiment lasted only until 1920, when the law was repealed due to opposition from dairy farmers (cows don't pay attention to clocks).

During World War II, Daylight Saving Time was imposed once again (this time year-round) to save fuel. Since then, Daylight Saving Time has been used on and off, with different start and end dates. Currently, Daylight Saving Time begins at 2:00 a.m. on the second Sunday of March and ends at 2:00 a.m. on the first Sunday in November.

Kingsbury Collection Station Rate Changes Today

The rates for use of the Kingsbury collection station are changing effective November 1, 2020.

Some charges have gone up slightly but the biggest change is that there will now be a \$2 per vehicle charge for recycling.

Here Comes November

Today, Sunday, is the first day of November.

November is the eleventh and penultimate month of the year in the Julian and Gregorian Calendars and the fourth and last month to have the length of 30 days. November was the ninth month of the ancient Roman calendar. November retained its name (from the Latin *novem* meaning "nine") when January and February were added to the Roman calendar.

The zodiac signs for the month of November are Scorpio (October 23-November 21) and Sagittarius (November 22 – December 21).



The November birthstone, the topaz, symbolizes love and **affection**. It is believed to give the wearer increased strength and intellect.

November Night Skies

The meteor showers that peak in the month of November are:



Taurid - Peak is November 5th with about 3 meteors per hour in the late evening. Leonid - Peaks on November 17th with 10 meteors per hour in the pre-dawn hours Andromedid - Peak is November 6th with about 5 meteors per hour in the late evenings.

A street scene in Kingsbury around 1900. The railroad tracks are running in front of a large pile of bricks and a part of the lumber company that has the remnants of an old Barnum & Bailey advertisement on the side. I wonder if the Barnum & Bailey circus ever came through Kingsbury?

There is a windmill **turning** above the general store that is advertising shoes on the sign hanging from the awning. There is a traffic gridlock as men and carts stop to discuss the day's events.

The gentleman in the two-horse cart is Kingsbury resident John H. Schmidt (1853 - 1932 and father of "Doc" Schmidt) - you can even see his signature mustache from this distance.
