Kingsbury Weather

Full Harvest Super Moon

Monday night, October 6th (at 10:48 pm Kingsbury time), is the rising of the Full Harvest Moon.

Normally, October's full moon is the Full Hunter's moon. Most of our monthly Moon names come from Native American and early American folklore, but the Hunter's Moon is always the first full Moon after autumnal equinox.

However ...

This year, the October full Moon is called the Harvest Moon. Unlike other full Moon names, which are specific to their respective months, the Harvest Moon is tied to an astronomical event: the autumnal equinox.

The full Moon that falls nearest to the equinox (September 22nd this year) takes on the name "Harvest Moon," rather than its traditional name. This means that a Harvest Moon could occur in either September or October. The Harvest Moon provides the most light at the time when it's needed most—to complete the harvest!

This is one of those unique years when October's full Moon — rather than September's — receives the iconic name of the "Full Harvest Moon." This switch occurs approximately every few years, with the last October Harvest Moon occurring in 2020.

What else makes this October full Moon special: It will be the first of three supermoons in a row!

A supermoon occurs when the Moon is at least 90% of the way to its perigee (the closest that the Moon comes to the Earth in its orbit). The association of the Moon with both oceanic and crustal (or "land") tides has led to claims that the supermoon phenomenon may be associated with increased risk of events like **earthquakes** and volcanic eruptions, but no such link has ever been found.

The October full Moon rises right around sunset—and sets around sunrise. It's the only night in the month when the Moon is in the sky all night long. In addition, because the October full moon rises around sunset near the horizon, it appears bigger and more orange than your typical Moon. However, this is just the "Moon Illusion." In 2025, though, it really will be bigger!

In the autumn months, there's no long period of darkness between sunset and moonrise for several days in a row, around the time of full moon. In the days before tractor lights, the lamp of the Harvest Moon helped farmers to gather their crops, despite the diminishing daylight hours. As the sun's light faded in the west, the moon would soon rise in the east to illuminate the fields throughout the night. A month later, after the harvest was done, the full Hunter's Moon was said to illuminate the prey of hunters, scooting along in the stubble left behind in the fields.



Burn Ban In Effect

The Guadalupe County Commissions Court instituted an outdoor burn ban for Guadalupe County for 90 days starting September 3rd and going through December 1st. The burn ban imposed by the Commissioners Court has **specific** guidelines for



Welding, cutting, and grinding or any activity that causes a spark



Burning household trash



Burning of other items

The official notification with all the guidelines can be found on the Guadalupe County website here.



The City of Kingsbury has a "trigger" ordinance where a burn ban is in effect in the city limits whenever there is a burn ban issued by the county.





Of the 254 counties in Texas, there are currently 98 that have a burn ban. This is up from 92 last week and leaves 156 counties without a burn ban in the state.






Pictured below is the Seguin thoroughfare plan with their "Outer Loop" coming up FM2438.



This plan once came up into downtown Kingsbury, but due to changes in Texas law, a property owner can now be removed from an ETJ (extraterritorial jurisdiction which is an area outside of any city's limits) and therefore be removed from their control. Shown below is Seguin's ETJ around Kingsbury (red dot) in tan with the white areas being landowners that have removed their properties from that ETJ.
