### Super Wolf Blood Moon

Tonight, Sunday January 20th, is a must see in the night sky - the Super Wolf Blood Moon.

The January full moon is known as the Full Wolf Moon. This year it will be a very special full moon due to a lunar eclipse (the last one till May 2021) turning the moon reddish in color and also being a "supermoon". That makes it a Super Wolf Blood Moon (or a Blood Wolf Super Moon or Super Blood Wolf Moon - any way you want to say it!)

A supermoon is a full moon that nearly coincides with perigee - the closest that the Moon comes to the Earth in its eliptic orbit - resulting in a slightly larger-than-usual apparent size. This supermoon will appear 14% bigger and 30% brighter than other full moons.

The action starts with the "super" moonrise at 5:43 pm and the partial eclipse beginning at 9:33 (when the moon enters that shaded area next to the Earth's shadow). Totality begins at 10:41, peaks at 11:16, and ends at 11:43. During this time is when the Moon should have that reddish color to it. The other side of the partial eclipse then begins after that and ends at 12:50 am.

In Native American and early Colonial times, the Full Moon for January was often called the Full Wolf Moon because it appeared when wolves howled in hunger outside the villages.

Traditionally, the January Moon is also known as the Old Moon (oddly enough since it is the first full moon of the new year) or the Moon After Yule.

To some Native American tribes, this was the Snow Moon, but most applied that name to the next Full Moon, in February.

### MOON FOLKLORE:




## "Transit" Art Show

## **Kingsbury News Past**


All the **news** that's fit to print about what was happening in Kingsbury . . .

The October 2, 1902 edition of the *Houston Daily Post* had an article about the Hon. John Garner speaking at Kingsbury and then at Nixon. This was John Nance Garner III, also known as "Cactus Jack", the lawyer from Uvalde. He served in the Texas House of Representatives from 1898 to 1902 and won election to represent Texas in the US House of Representatives in 1902. He must have been campaigning for that post when he stopped in Kingsbury and was "met with strong applause".

Garner ultimately represented Texas in the House until 1933, serving as Speaker of the House from 1931 to 1933. At that point, he became Franklin D. Roosevelt's running mate and served as Vice President of the United States from 1933 until 1941.

Garner at Kingsbury. Kingsbury, Texas, September John Garner spoke today to a large and enthusiastic audience at both Kingsbury and Nixon. He discussed at length the issues now before the American people. At Kingsbury he dwelt at length upon the imperialistic policy of the republican party. He met with strong applause at many points during his address.
At Nixon the audience was equally zentous in support of Judge Garner. A tidal wave of Garner enthusiasm is sweeping over the county. The comment heard is, "Well, Garner is aff right." People who were lukewarm are hearty in their support of the democratic candidate. Judge Garner speaks at Staples tonight,

Prohibition Will Be Effective in Effia.



Mr. P. M. Granberry, the contractor who is bering the artesian well on the Clemens State farm in Brazoria, was the victim of a serious accident Tuesday evening. He was assisting in raising about 500 feet of the four-inch pipe when in some manner his left hand was caught and before he could withdraw it the four fingers were pulled off. The body was wound up in the drum before the machinery could be stopped and Mr. Granberry was taken out more dead than alive. He was brought to Houston yesterday afternoon and conveyed to his home. ## Martin Luther King Jr. Day

Monday, January 21st is Martin Luther King Jr. Day.

Officially called Birthday of Martin Luther King, Jr. (and sometimes referred to as MLK Day), it is an American federal holiday marking the birthday of Martin Luther King Jr. It is observed on the third Monday of January each year, which is around King's birthday, January 15.


King was the chief spokesperson for nonviolent **activism** in the Civil Rights Movement, which successfully protested racial discrimination in federal and state law. The campaign for a federal holiday in King's honor began soon after his assassination in 1968. President Ronald Reagan signed the holiday into law in 1983, and it was first observed three years later. At first, some states resisted observing the holiday as such, giving it alternative names or combining it with other holidays. It was officially observed in all 50 states for the first time in 2000.

## **Stopping Forced Annexation**

During the last legislative session, counties in Texas were designated as Tier 1 (less than 500,000 in population) and Tier 2 (greater than 500,000 in population) and the cities in a Tier 2 county can no longer force annex people's property into their city limits - the people get a chance to vote on being annexed or not. If a county is a

Tier 1 (like Guadalupe), the cities in it can still **forcibly** annex properties, giving the annexed property owners no choice but to pay that city's property taxes and abide by their laws, and restrictions.

But there is a way to have a Tier 1 county designated as a Tier 2 and stop forced annexations. When 10% of the registered voters in the county sign a petition, the county must add a proposition to the next election that gives the citizens the chance to vote on changing the county to a Tier 2. Several counties in Texas have already had a petition drive to get the Tier 2 designation on the ballot and have voted with a resounding "Yes" - Parker, Wise, Johnson, Freestone, Palo Pinto, Ellis, and Atascosa. Many others, like Guadalupe, are now working to get that proposition on their next ballot.

The City of Kingsbury, by law and by conscience, only annexes when requested by the landowner. The city leaders do not believe in forced annexation and were some of the first to sign the petition to change Guadalupe county to a Tier 2. 


## **Kingsbury School Daze**
