Valentine's Day

This Thursday is Valentine's Day.

But it didn't start that way!

On February 14, around the year 278 A.D., Valentine, a holy priest in Rome in the days of Emperor Claudius II, was executed.

Under the rule of Claudius the Cruel, Rome was involved in many unpopular and bloody campaigns. The emperor had to maintain a strong army, but was having a difficult time getting soldiers to join his military leagues. Claudius believed that Roman men were unwilling to join the army because of their strong attachment to their wives and families.

To get rid of the problem, Claudius banned all marriages and engagements in Rome. Valentine, realizing the injustice of the decree, defied Claudius and continued to perform marriages for young lovers in secret.

When Valentine's actions were discovered, Claudius ordered that he be put to death. Valentine was arrested and dragged before the Prefect of Rome, who condemned him to be beaten to death with clubs and to have his head cut off. The sentence was carried out on February 14, on or about the year 270.

Legend also has it that while in jail, St. Valentine left a farewell note for the jailer's daughter, who had become his friend, and signed it "From Your Valentine."

For his great service, Valentine was named a saint after his death.

Did you know? While 75% of chocolate purchases are made by women all year long, during the days and minutes before Valentine's Day, 75% of the chocolate purchases are made by men.




That says it all, doesn't it?!

Stopping Forced Annexation

During the last legislative session, counties in Texas were designated as Tier 1 (less than 500,000 in population) and Tier 2 (greater than 500,000 in population) and the cities in a Tier 2 county can no longer force annex people's property into their city limits - the people get a chance to vote on being annexed or not. If a county is a Tier 1 (like Guadalupe), the cities in it can still forcibly annex properties, giving the annexed property owners no choice but to pay that city's property taxes and abide by their laws, and restrictions.

But there is a way to have a Tier 1 county designated as a Tier 2 and stop forced annexations. When 10% of the registered voters in the county sign a petition, the county must add a proposition to the next election that gives the citizens the chance to vote on changing the county to a Tier 2. Several counties in Texas have already had a petition drive to get the Tier 2 designation on the ballot and have voted with a resounding "Yes" - Parker, Wise, Johnson, Freestone, Palo Pinto, Ellis, and Atascosa. Many others, like Guadalupe, are now working to get that proposition on their next ballot.

The City of Kingsbury, by law and by conscience, only annexes when requested by the landowner. The city leaders do not believe in forced annexation and were some of the first to sign the petition to change Guadalupe county to a Tier 2. They can drop off and pick up petition sheets anywhere in the Kingsbury area. Curbside service!

The deadline for delivery of the petitions has been extended to the end of February in order to get the proposition on the May ballot. That's just

All the **news** that's fit to print about what was happening in Kingsbury . . .

The December 3, 1902 edition of the *Shiner Gazette* has a wonderful little article on the wedding of Miss Maggie Fahrenthold of Bertram and Mr. H.E. Bertram, "a prosperous young farmer of Kingsbury." The wedding took place in Dreyer which is now just a stop sign at the intersection of FM 443 and FM 370 about 7 miles southwest of Shiner. In 1902, though, Dreyer had a population of about 100 and it sounds like the food, drink, and cigars were flowing all evening and a high time was had by all!




Ring! Ring! Listen

to the ringing of the wedding bells! Married at the resinence of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Fahrenthold, their daughter Miss Maggie O. Fahrenthold to Mr. H. E. Bertram, of Kingsbury. The bride is one of our most accomplished young ladies and the groom is a prosperous young farmer of Kingsbury. We offer congratulations. The wedding took place Wednesday evening at 2 o'clock and all were invited to partake of bounteous feast, where the table seemed fairly groaning with its load of eatables. Refreshments were not forgotten in the shape of wine, beer and cigars and so feasting, drinking music, were the continged program till 11 p. m., when the guests departed with congratulations for the young couple and praise for the hospitality of their host and hostess.

Elsewhere, the owners of the Bank Saloon picked a great name ("Of course I'm not going drinking - I'm just going to the Bank"), Lion Coffee is giving out free Christmas Games, and in Local News you can get your hair singed at Koepke's (a method of removing unwanted hair by using fire), and while you're there, you can get a hot or cold bath (who in the world wants a cold bath?!). There were quite a number of little one-liners in the paper, "owing to hard times and a scarcity of money" A.V. Schvab has their Holiday Goods on sale, and tint your butter with June Tint Butter Color (I know that's the only butter color *I* use).








Also in Shiner, get your Pearl Beer from Agent F.P. Luck (the Spoetzl Brewery wouldn't start up until 1909 so there was no Shiner Beer yet in Shiner), there was a "serious accident" on the Texas (the first *USS Texas* was undergoing a refit in Virginia at the time), and poor Mr. McRady was in the caboose of a train when it was rearended by another - now he's just a "mere handful" of bones. If you have skunk or possum skins A.E. Burkhardt in Cincinnati want one million of 'em, get Mustang Liniment for "burns or scalds" on you or your "beast", and here's a "burglar alarm" you can set up with open flame - does *not* sound safe to me!
