Here's the latest on what's going on in Kingsbury!

Full Flower Moon

This Thursday, May 7th, is the full moon known as the Full Flower Moon.

We use Full Moon names that were used during Native American and Colonial times to help track the seasons. Depending on the tribe, May's Full Moon was called the Full Flower Moon as well as Mother's Moon, Milk Moon, and Corn Planting Moon. The May Moon marked a time of increasing fertility, with temperatures warm enough for safely bearing young, a near end to late frosts, and plants in bloom.

The fool moon in May got the name "Flower Moon" because **flowers** spring forth in abundance this month. The name Milk Moon may come from the fact that May is a time when so many animals bear and begin nursing their young. But cows would not have been included with that group as they are not native to the Americas.

The Ontario Native Literacy Coalition notes that while the Ojibwe tribes of the Great Lakes area called the May full moon a Flower Moon ("Waawaaskone Giizis"), people of the Cree Nation in northern Montana and parts of Canada named it the Frog Moon because this was the time of year frogs became active.

Although many Native American tribes gave distinct names to the full moon, the most well known full moon names come from the Algonquin tribes who lived in the area of New England and westward to Lake Superior. The Algonquin tribes had perhaps the greatest effect on the early European settlers in America, and the settlers adopted the Native American habit of naming the full moons.

As with all full moons, the one in May goes by many names:

Sioux - Moon When the Ponies Shed
Shawnee - Strawberry Moon
Mohawk - Time of Big Leaf Moon
Hopi - Moon of Waiting
Cree - Frog Moon
Choctaw - Moon of Mulberry and Panther Moon
Cherokee - Planting Moon
Apache - Season When the Leaves Are Green Moon
Algonquin - Moon When Women Weed Corn
Chippewa - Blossom Moon
Arapaho - Moon When the Ponies Shed Their Shaggy Hair
Cheyenne - Moon When the Horses Get Fat
Comanche - Flower Moon
Lakota - Moon of the Green Leaves
Shoshone - Budding Moon

Colonial American - Milk Moon Chinese - Dragon Moon

Celtic - Bright Moon Medieval English - Hare Moon Neo Pagan - Grass Moon

Often the moon will look a bit redder in the Northern Hemisphere during warmer months, as the moonlight has to travel through more atmosphere to reach one's eyes. The best times for these effects are usually near the rising and setting times.




Farmers Market


That says it all, doesn't it?!

Meetings maybe cancelled due to COVID-19 restrictions. You can check the Kingsbury calendar for cancellations.





COVID-19 In Guadalupe County

As the world goes through the Coronavirus COVID-19 pandemic, we are all looking for information on the impact in our area. A good place for info is on the Guadalupe County website. The county has a "dashboard" showing cases of the virus on a county map, the numbers of recoveries, number of people hospitalized, etc. It's good to know what is going on around the globe, but it's probably even more important to know what's happening in our immediate area. There was a big jump in the number of reported cases this week. As it stands, 52 people have now recovered, leaving the county with 43 active cases.

The numbers had been going in the right direction but there were many more diagnosed this week with COVID-19 than recovered this week. Last week there were 20 active cases and this week there are 43. Below are the dashboards from last week and this week.





Meteor Shower

Halley's Comet won't swing by Earth again until 2061, but you could see pieces of it this week.

The Eta Aquarid meteor shower made of debris from Halley's Comet will peak this week. The meteors are bits of Halley's Comet that separated from the comet "many hundreds of years ago," according to the American Meteor Society.

Although the Perseid meteor shower in August may draw the most attention, the Eta Aquarid meteor shower, which occurs from roughly late April to mid-May, offers a long stretch of **spectacular** "shooting stars" that even a casual observer can spot in the night sky.

The peak of the Eta Aquarid meteor shower, when the most meteors are visible, should happen before dawn on May 5, according to NASA's Meteoroid Environment Office. Rates this year can reach up to 40 meteors per hour during that time, in theory. The shower is of medium brightness, and the darker your skies the more you'll see.

Although the moon will be in its waxing gibbous phase when the Eta Aquarids peak just two days before full moon, the moon will set below the horizon before dawn and thereafter won't put a damper on meteor shower viewing.
