Here Comes September!

Tomorrow starts the the month of September!

September is the ninth month of the year, the third of four months to have a length of 30 days, and the fourth of five months to have a length of less than 31 days. In the Northern Hemisphere September is the seasonal equivalent of March in the Southern Hemisphere.


September (from Latin *septem*, "seven") was originally the seventh of ten months on the oldest known Roman calendar, with March (Latin *Martius*) the first month of the year until perhaps as late as 153 BC. After the calendar reform that added January and February to the beginning of the year, September became the ninth month, but retained its name. It had 29 days until the Julian reform, which added a day.



Meteor showers that occur in September include:

Aurigids - August 28 - September 5 ~~ Peak: September 1

Epsilon Perseids - September 5-21 ~~ Peak: September 12



Southern Taurids - September 10 - November 20 ~~ Peak: None. They just ramble on with no sharp peak.



Get ready for fall! The Autumnal **Equinox** falls on September 22, 2025 at 1:19 pm our time. At this time, there are approximately equal hours of daylight and darkness.

September, in Old England, was called *Haervest-monath* (Harvest Month). This is the time to gather up the rest of the harvest and prepare for the winter months.

September's birth flowers are the aster and the morning glory.



The aster signifies powerful love, and the China aster expresses variety or afterthought in the language of flowers.



The morning glory symbolizes affection. It can also mean coquetry, affectation, or bonds in the language of flowers.

The September birthstone is the sapphire, which was once thought to guard against evil and poisoning.



Sapphire is a form of corundum that is typically blue, a color caused by tiny bits of iron and titanium; the vivid, medium blues are more valuable than lighter or darker forms. Due to various trace elements, sapphires also appear in other colors. Those with red colors are called rubies.

Sapphires were thought to encourage divine wisdom and protection. They symbolized purity, truth, trust, and loyalty.

Some believed that if they were placed in a jar with a snake, the snake would die.

The sapphire, along with the related ruby, are the second-hardest natural gemstones, with only the diamond being harder.

Labor Day

This Monday, September 1st, is Labor Day!

Labor Day in the United States is a public holiday celebrated on the first Monday in September. It honors the American labor movement and the contributions that workers have made to the strength, **prosperity**, and well-being of the country. It is the Monday of the long weekend known as Labor Day Weekend and it is considered the unofficial end of summer.

Beginning in the late 19th century, as the trade union and labor movements grew, trade unionists proposed that a day be set aside to celebrate labor. "Labor Day" was promoted by the Central Labor Union and the Knights of Labor, which organized the first parade in New York City. In 1887, Oregon was the first state of the United States to make it an official public holiday. By the time it became an official federal holiday in 1894, thirty U.S. states officially celebrated Labor Day.

Canada's Labour Day is also celebrated on the first Monday of September. More than 80 countries celebrate International Workers' Day on May 1st – the ancient European holiday of May Day – and several countries have chosen their own dates for Labour Day.

Everyone in the Kingsbury area is welcome to attend. Come on down and meet your friends and neighbors!



There should be no more extended delays for the "leveling", but expect some short delays when the striping begins.




Kingsbury City Limits

Stars & Stripes Waves For First Time

This week in history, the American flag is flown in **battle** for the first time, during a Revolutionary War skirmish at Cooch's Bridge, Delaware on September 3rd, 1777. Patriot General William Maxwell ordered the stars and stripes banner raised as a detachment of his infantry and cavalry met an advance guard of British and Hessian troops. The rebels were defeated and forced to retreat to General George Washington's main force near Brandywine Creek in Pennsylvania.

Three months before, on June 14, the Continental Congress adopted a resolution stating that "the flag of the United States be thirteen alternate stripes red and white" and that "the Union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new Constellation." The national flag, which became known as the "Stars and Stripes," was based on the "Grand Union" flag, a banner carried by the Continental Army in 1776 that also consisted of 13 red and white stripes.

At The Imhoff Saloon

Ferd and Henry Imhoff tending the bar at the Imhoff Saloon in Kingsbury in the early 1900s.

Ferd and Henry were the sons of Jacob and Hanna Klein Imhoff and lived and worked in Kingsbury all their lives.

Ferd was the older brother and lived here from 1877 to 1949. Henry lived in Kingsbury from 1880 to 1947.

There are several bucket-style spittoons on the floor for the patrons (I hope they hit them most of the time) and the picture above the large cabinet on the left seems to be a harbor scene. The mirror behind the bar has a beautiful leaf pattern painted on it and kerosene **lanterns** on each side. The wall to the right of the mirror has pictures of racehorses, a poster picture of a lady, a bar scene painting with a patron wearing a bowler hat, and a calendar that is showing the January page. The year on the calendar is not clear, but the years around the time of the picture and that had January 1st on a Wednesday were 1902, 1913, and 1919. I wonder what would be in the flower-painted cooler behind the bar on the right? Water? Coffee?

Ferd (on the left) seems to be "sampling the wares" of the bar.
