Happy New Year!

We have successfully completed another orbit around the sun! The new year begins Wednesday and while celebrations vary all over the world, common traditions include:

Making resolutions or goals to improve one's life. Common resolutions concern diet, exercise, bad habits, and other issues concerning personal wellness.

A common view is to use the first day of the year as a clean slate to improve one's life.

A gathering of loved ones: Here you'll typically find **champagne**, feasting, confetti, noise makers, and other methods of merriment Fireworks, parades, concerts.



Famous parades include London's New Year's Day Parade and the Rose Parade in Pasadena, California.



Superstitions concerning food or visitors to bring luck. This especially includes circle-shaped foods, which symbolize cycles.

The reasoning behind superstitions is that the first day of the year sets precedent for the following days.



A common superstition specific to New Year's Day concerns a household's first visitor of the year—tradition states that if a tall, dark-haired stranger is the first to walk through your door, called the First Footer or Lucky Bird, you'll have good luck all year.



Also, if you want to subscribe to superstition, don't let anything leave the house on New Year's Day, except for people. Tradition say's: don't take out the trash and leave anything you want to take out of the house on New Year's outside the night before. If you must remove something, make sure to replace it by bringing an item into the house. These policies of balance apply in other areas as well—avoiding paying bills, breaking anything, or shedding tears.



The first of January was a highly significant day in medieval superstitions regarding prosperity, or lack of it, in the year ahead. A flat cake was put on one of the horns of a cow in every farmyard. The farmer and his workers would then sing a song and dance around the cow until the cake was thrown to the ground. If it fell in front of the cow, that signified good luck; to fall behind indicated the opposite.



I think it is much easier to eat some black-eyed peas and cabbage and just ensure a lucky and prosperous new year!

NEW YEAR'S WEATHER FOLKLORE

In particular, weather folklore often looks to the wind.

Try this. Step outside as the sun sets on New Year's Eve. Feel the wind and recite:

If New Year's Eve the wind blows south
It betokens warmth and growth.
If west, much milk and fish in the sea.
If north, cold and storms there will be.
If east, the trees will bear much fruit.
If north east, then flee it, man and brute.



Others believed the time to check out the wind was at sunrise on New Year's Day, but if you had any fun the night before, it will be hard to wake up at dawn.

If you forgot to check the wind, don't worry.

Other lore says that the first 12 days of the year are just as useful. The weather on the first, good or bad, will reflect how January will feel. The second day forecasts February and so on.

Here's to having an even better year than 2024 was. Everyone needs to eat lots of black-eyed peas and cabbage!



Hello January

In addition to the first of the new year, this is the first week of the new month of January.

January was originally the eleventh month, not the first, until at least 153 B.C.

January is named after the Roman god Janus, who was always shown as having two heads. He looked back to the last year and forward to the new one. The Roman New Year festival was called the *Calends*, and people decorated their homes and gave each other gifts.

The January birthstone, the garnet, is thought to keep the wearer safe during travel. Garnets were also thought to prevent **nightmares**. If you dream of losing a garnet necklace, unexpected good fortune is in your future.

The January birth flowers are the carnation and snowdrop.



The carnation comes in several different colors, which convey different meanings, much like roses. A pink carnation means affection, while a red carnation means 'I love you.' White carnations mean pure love, striped carnations mean regret that a love is not shared, and yellow means rejection or disappointment.



The snowdrop used to be considered bad luck because it always seemed to grow in graveyards, but nowadays, this delicate flower signifies hope and beauty.


Burn Ban Still In Effect

There was no **change** to the burn ban map this week, with 100 counties (including Guadalupe County) still under a burn ban.

The Guadalupe County Commissions Court instituted an outdoor burn ban for Guadalupe County for 90 days starting October 2nd. The burn ban imposed by the Commissioners Court has specific guidelines for

The City of Kingsbury has a "trigger" ordinance where a burn ban is in effect in the city limits whenever there is a burn ban issued by the county.



Current burn bans by county in Texas this week.




Kingsbury City Limits

Black Moon

This Monday night, the Black Moon will rise!

Like "Blood Moon" and "Blue Moon," "Black Moon" is not an astronomical term. In fact, if you ask a sample of astronomers, both professional and amateur, very few will have even heard of it. It's not even a particularly widely known folklore thing.

As for its definition, it's a "Black Moon" if there is a <u>new</u> Moon twice in the same month. It's similar to the Blue Moon, which has become a common term for the second <u>full</u> Moon in a month.

A Black Moon occurs usually every 32 to 33 months.



There is no astronomical significance to a Black Moon. Nothing happens, except the usual new Moon absence of any Moon in the sky, plus the stronger so-called "spring" tides we get for a few days around every full Moon and new Moon.

What will you see during a Black Moon? Uh, not much. During the new Moon phase, the Moon is not illuminated by the Sun and seems to disappear from the night sky. A new Moon is practically **invisible** to the naked eye, so there's nothing to see during a so-called Black Moon.

Remember, there are four quarters of the Moon—the Moon phases. You all know the "full Moon," when the entire disk of the Moon is illuminated by the Sun (because they are on opposite sides of the sky). In contrast, the

"new Moon" has its dark side facing us. It's not reflecting any of the Sun's light because the Moon is lined up between the Earth and Sun.

Although there's not much to see when a Black Moon rises, the good news is that a moonless sky is excellent for stargazing since the Moon's light won't drown out the stars!

With the San Antonio Fat Stock Show and Rodeo coming up in about a month, this picture from Patsy Ulbricht of her father, Albert Pape, with his Grand Champion hog seems perfect!

This picture was taken at the South-West Texas Boys Fat Stock Show in San Antonio on February 26, 1936.

This would have probably been his senior year at the Kingsbury School.

As shown on the results list, he was the Grand Champion of the Hog Division that year! Nolan Schubert from Kingsbury was showing there also in the Hog Division. With the sales weight of 235 lb. and the price per pound of 0.34 (thank you Apache Pkg. Co.) that gave Albert a **whopping** \$79.90! The equivalent in purchasing power of that today would be \$1,813.52. Way to go Albert!
