


That says it all, doesn't it?!



Kingsbury News Past

All the **news** that's fit to print about what was happening in Kingsbury . . .

The September 6, 1875 edition of the San Antonio *Daily Express* had an article about the city tax on fruit peddlers. Apparently, San Antonio taxed the itinerant fruit peddlers less than local fruit dealers. The article mentions that the itinerant dealers don't spend any money in town at hotels or "eating houses" and when they run out of produce, they simply "go back to Austin or Kingsbury for more." Since Kingsbury was still the terminus of the railroad at that time, fruit and other cargo had to come through Kingsbury to go any farther west.



The city government of San Antonio, matike any other that we know of, taxes her own settled fruit dealers higher than the itinerant fruit peddlers who occasionally come among us. Our own fruit dealers have to pay \$25 per anum, and the transient peddlers only pay \$10. We have not heard any of our fruit dealers complain that their tax is too high; on the contrary, they pay it cheerfully; but we do hear complaint that the peddlers are taxed so lightly. The city of Austin, we are informed, taxes her home fruit dealers \$25, just as San Antonio does; but she taxes the fruit peddlers from abroad \$27.50, and we think she is right in so doing.

The reasons, for this disprimination in behalf of the home fruit dealers are plain. They make up part of the sitizenship of our city; they build their houses and establish their homes among he; they spend or invest their money among us; they help to support our schools and churches, and other public institutions; they patronize and support our newspapers, our banks, or moreantile establishments. The itiperant fruit venders do none of these things. They spend nothing here, and invest nothing. They do not even support our hotels, bearding houses, restaurants, or eating houses. They generally camp out, and as they sell out their loads, they go back to Austin or Kingsbury for more. They help wear out our streets, and pay scarcely anything to help repair them.

We hope our city fathers will not hereafter discriminate against our home dealers.

Elsewhere in 1875, they were celebrating the new bridge over the Missouri in Kansas but a train coming to the event derailed before it got there, the telegraph line to Ireland has been repaired and the first cable let them know to "be on the lookout" for the ship *Faraday*, and the crew and passengers aboard a schooner "were taken down with fever." Apparently they "spoke an English bark" (contacted a barque sailing ship) for assistance which turned them down.

There are "Fine four horse Coaches" going to some places I've never heard of - Coglins (can't find any record of this town), Benficklin (Ben Ficklin was destroyed in a flood in 1882 and abandoned), Ysleta (now part of El Paso, and Kickapoo Springs (which became Erskine which became Vigo which disappeared in the 1930s). There are some really, really bad men "now reported to be in Texas" with a "death-roll", and someone is looking for their fifty-dollar bills and change. \$107 in 1875 is worth about \$3424 today - so good luck someone turning that in!

CELEBRATION -ACCIDENTS.

Atkinson, Kan., Sept.: 31—The celebration of the completion of the bridge over the Missouri was the largest ever known in this section of the country.

A train coming to the celebration ran off the track. Two killed.

REPAIRS TO THE CABLE.

New York, Ang. 31.—It was reported yesterday that a dispatch had been received, announcing that the direct cable had been repaired, and that communication by it between this country and Ireland was complete. The Superintendent of the company owning the cable said a dispatch had been received during the day which told him to be on the lockout for the Faraday, which might be expected at any moment.

THE DREADFUL FEVER ATSKA.

Baltimore, Md., September 1.—
The schooner N. J. Miller, eighteen days from San Domingo City, for Boston, has afrived here, and reported that, when five days out, all on board except the master were taken down with fever. On August 28 they spoke an English bark, which refused assistance. On the 29th they spoke the schooner Annie L. Palmer, Cartain Lewis, of Bath, Me., and were rendered prompt assistance. Two men are recovering. Four are still dangerously ill.

THE BLOODY GROUND. The October birthstone is the opal, which symbolizes faithfulness and confidence.


