May 11 Texas Tornados

This Thursday, May 11, is a **bad** day for tornados in Texas history.

A deadly series of at least 33 tornadoes hit at least 10 different U.S. states on May 9–11, 1953. Tornadoes appeared daily from Minnesota in the north to Texas in the south. The strongest and deadliest tornado was a powerful F5 tornado that struck Waco on May 11, causing 114 of the 144 deaths in the outbreak. Alongside the 1902 Goliad tornado, it was the deadliest tornado in Texas history and is the 11th deadliest tornado in U.S. history.

The tornado's winds demolished more than 600 houses, 1,000 other structures, and over 2,000 vehicles. 597 injuries occurred, and many survivors had to wait more than 14 hours for rescue. The destruction dispelled a myth that the geography of the region spared Waco from tornadoes, and along with other deadly tornadoes in 1953, the Waco disaster was a catalyst for advances in understanding the link between tornadoes and radar-detected hook echoes. It also generated support for improved civil defense systems, the formation of weather radar networks, and improved communications between stakeholders such as meteorologists, local officials, and the public.

The Waco tornado was not the only deadly and damaging tornado in the outbreak sequence. On the same day as the Waco disaster, a high-end F4 tornado struck the Texas city of San Angelo, causing catastrophic damage, killing 13 people, and injuring more than 150. The tornado swept away numerous homes and damaged a school, but students inside escaped serious injuries.

In 1970, portions of Lubbock were struck by a powerful multiple-vortex tornado after nightfall on May 11 resulting

tornadoes to ever receive the rating. Later, it was downgraded to an F5 rating after Fujita declared F6 damage was "inconceivable". The extremity of the damage and the force required to displace heavy objects as much as was observed indicated that winds produced by vortices within the tornado may have reached as high as 290 mph.




Kingsbury City Limits

Kingsbury News Past

All the **news** that's fit to print about what was happening in Kingsbury . . .



The July 13, 1876 edition of the *San Antonio Express* had an item about a new stagecoach line taking passengers between San Antonio and Kingsbury. At this time, Kingsbury was still the last stop on the railroad going west and a stagecoach ride was needed to go further. The Stage and Express Line would also deliver packages "brought from Kingsbury" free of charge. What a deal! The paper also had mentions of Kingsbury for the GH&SA Railroad and the Lumber Yard that were in

In other 1876 news, the battle at Little Bighorn was really hitting the press (the battle occurred just a couple of weeks prior on June 25-26, but information in 1876 was a bit slow) and an item on Sitting Bull said he was "one of the most successful scalpers in the Indian country", J. Sheern can see to "Every department of the Undertaking Business", there's news out of Pleasanton that Captain McNelly (a famous Texas Ranger) and his men had a run-in with King Fisher (a famous Texas gunslinger) and his "brigade of desperadoes", and send your address to Inventors Union and you will "get something that will bring you in honorably over \$150 a month sure" (that's over \$4200 today). Sure it will.

Elsewhere in 1876, a sorrel mare that is "rather thin in order" was lost or stolen, Charles Graham, Esq. "the celebrated Bartender and Billiardist" is at the Crystal, a young boy was shot and killed by Mr. Gregg who was subsequently "arrested, but escaped", go see the "jolly face" Mr. McAllister if you are fond of sour mash bourbon, and an extended article on the details of the Battle of Little Bighorn.

Also in 1876 the royals of Greece are visiting the royals of England (Queen Victoria was the English monarch at that time), you can get tar that is "suitable for painting or sanitary purposes" (what the heck does tar have to do with either of those??). and Don Carlos of Spain is visiting in the US and may be thinking of conquering Cuba (which was still in the middle of the Ten Years War of independence from Spain) and setting up "business for himself as an amateur King".

SITTING BULL was the commander of the Indian forces in the fatal tight with His Indian name Tatonku Custer. Otahha. He is described to be about five feet in height. He has a large head, eyes and nose, high cheek bones, one of his le; s is shorter than the other, from a gun shot wound in his left knoe, His countenando is of an extremely savage type, betraying that bloodthirstiness and brutality for which he has been so long notorious. He has the name of being one of the most successful scalpers in the Indian country. There has been a standing reward of \$1,000 effered for his head for the last eight years, by the Montana people, who have special cause to know his ferocious nature, some of the werst deeds having been purpetrated in that Torritory.

MILITARY VIEWS OF THE CUSTER DISASTER.

The Globe-Democrat reports the views prevalent among military men at St. Louis in regard to the causes of the disaster to Gen. Caster and his command. They say that Gen. Custer had been displaced from command of the department early in the year, and superseded by Gen. Terry. A month or two since Gen. Crook met Sitting Bull and his braves twice, and prudently retired each time to await reinforcements. For this prudence he met with some severe criticism, but the result shows he was a pretty arcurate judge of the character of the for with whom he had to deal.

After the retirement of Gen. Crook's command, the Sloax, under the lead of their able chieftain, made a straight shoot in a nearly southwestwardly direction, and crossing the Big Horn river above its junction with the Little Dig Horn, pitched his camp on the right bank of the latter stream, about twenty miles above its confluence with the former. It is supposed that at this time Sitting Bull had at least three thousand warriors under his command, all well armed. mounted and trained in the use of their weapons. His design evidently was elther to attack the approaching columns in detail, or to allow himself to be attacked by them as they came up one after the other. How he enceeded in his plan the slaughter reported by telegraph will tell. Said Gen. Sturgis to the

"That fellow Sitting Bull Is a man of brams; he is a strategist and seeks to whip his enemy in detail." At the time the Sieux took their station on the banks of the Little Big Horn, there were four columns of troops converging in the direction of their camp. The first consisted of the 7th Cavairy, under command of Gen. Custer and Col. Reno. This, however, might property be considered as only the advanced guard of Gen. Terry's forces, which were marching from Fort Lincoln, opposite Bismarck, on the Missouri river, in a general by northwesterly direction. Gen. Terry's force is not accurately known, but it numbered, certainly, the full fighting force of the 17th and 20th Infantry, together with the reserves of the 7th Cavalry, making with all, probably, 1,500 men.

From the direction of Montanas Gen. Gibbon was advancing with another, though smaller, column, and from the line of the Pacific railroad, with Fort McPherson as a sort of guide point, Gen. Carr was moving up with another force gathered from scattered points.

In the meantime Gen. Crook had been industriously engaged gathering and rallying troops at Fort Fetterman, in the Sioux territory, and all these four columns were destined to attack Sitting Bull in his home. The first to appear before the red General was Gen. Custer, with his twelve companies of the 7th Cavalry. Of course, it is impossible now to say what motives impelled the dead hero, but the army officers seem to think that in a rash desire to re-establish a fame somewhat beelouded by the misfortunes of his last campaign, he purposely rushed into the fight in the hope of winning victory against overwhelm, ing odds before any of the forces of Gen. Terry could come up and share the coveted honors.


