

Here Comes May

This Wednesday is the first day of the month of May.

May is the fifth month of the year in the Julian and Gregorian Calendars and the third month to have the length of 31 days. May is also the month with the shortest name.

The month 'may' have been named for the Greek goddess *Maia*, who was identified with the Roman goddess of fertility, *Bona Dea*, whose festival was held in May. The Roman poet Ovid had another idea: May, he said, was named for the *maiores* (the elders) and June for the *iuniores* (youth).

The May birth flowers are the lily of the valley and the hawthorn plant.



The fragrant lily of the valley signifies **sweetness**, humility, and a return to happiness. If you want to show your loved one that your life is complete with them, give them a few lilies of the valley.



The other May flower is the hawthorn plant, which represents hope and supreme happiness.

Hawthorn signifies that you want only the best for the recipient.

May Birthstone - Facts & Folklore

The May birthstone, the emerald, was a favorite gem of Cleopatra and Catherine the Great.



It has long been associated with fertility, rebirth, and love.

Emeralds, like aquamarine, are a form of the mineral beryl. In the 1700s, powdered emeralds were sold by chemists to help relieve pain.

Today, it is thought that emeralds signify wisdom, growth, and patience.

Old saying: April showers bring May flowers. Old joke: What do May flowers bring? answer: Pilgrims. (or June bugs)




The Eta Aquariids meteor shower appears in May. It is visible from about April 15 to about May 27 this year with peak activity on May 5-6.


Camels Arrive In Texas

This week in Texas history, on April 29, 1856, a shipload of camels arrived at the Texas port of Indianola. Secretary of War Jefferson Davis had urged Congress to bring the animals from North Africa to help the army in its Indian operations. Major H. C. Wayne sailed to North Africa in the naval storeship *Supply* in May 1855 and

returned with the first thirty-three camels in April 1856.

On June 4 Wayne set off with his caravan for the frontier posts. The expedition stopped for a time at Victoria, where the animals were clipped and Mrs. Mary A. Shirkey made camel-hair socks for the president of the United States. At Camp Verde experiments were conducted to test the camels' utility in chasing Indians and transporting supplies.

Although more camels were imported, ultimately the experiment failed. Handlers found the animals **smelly**, obnoxious, and hard to control. Escaped camels roamed the desert for years and got into the folklore of the region.



Model T Raffle


The Pioneer Flight Museum here in Kingsbury is raffling off a **real** model T!

Kentucky Derby

Next Saturday, May 4th, is the 150th running of the Kentucky Derby - "the most exciting two minutes in sports."

The Kentucky Derby is the oldest continuously run sporting event in the nation and the most wagered-upon race in the world. Though a few other races began before the Derby, there were years when they weren't run. The Kentucky Derby has been run each year since 1875. Since the race is only open to 3-year-olds, each horse only gets one **shot** at the roses in his or her lifetime.

The current favorites are Sierra Leone, Catching Freedom, Fierceness, and, once again, Kingsbury's own Donkey Hotie.

We tell Donkey Hotie that that he's running every year, but alas, as always he's a lover, not a racer! He only runs when he hears the feed bucket. And with those ears he can hear it a long way off!









Old Nixon School

There was a time when Nixon was in Guadalupe County! It was here around the Kingsbury area on FM1150 but was renamed Old Nixon when a new town of Nixon emerged in Gonzales County.

This is a picture of the Old Nixon school class sometime in the early 1900s. Everybody appears to be very well dressed with bowties and ribbons and has that very serious picture-taking face. Today, we smile for pictures, but around 1900, you tried to look your most **dignified** on the extremely rare occasion that you had a picture taken.

Pretty much all that is left of Old Nixon is the Old Nixon Cemetery on FM1150. The cemetery has a Texas historical marker with this text:

This graveyard is the last visible reminder of the Old Nixon Community, which grew up here in the mid-19th century. The settlement was named for Robert T. Nixon and became known as Old Nixon after another town in Gonzales County took the Nixon name. The cemetery, which was first known as Stockton Cemetery, was formally set aside in the deed records by Gabriel C. Stockton. The earliest documented grave is that of Nancy McLean (1802-1867). Also interred here are members of the Nixon, Ramage, Ranft, and other pioneer families.
