


Kingsbury City Commission

at 6:30 in the Kingsbury Volunteer Fire Department fire station at 1060 FM 1104.



Blue Jeans Are Born

This week in American history, on May 20, 1873, San Francisco businessman Levi Strauss and Reno, Nevada, tailor Jacob Davis are given a patent to create work pants reinforced with metal rivets, marking the birth of one of the world's most famous garments: blue jeans.


In San Francisco, Strauss established a wholesale dry goods business under his own name and worked as the West Coast representative of his family's firm. His new business imported clothing, fabric and other dry goods to sell in the small stores opening all over California and other Western states to supply the rapidly expanding communities of **gold** miners and other settlers. By 1866, Strauss had moved his company to expanded headquarters and was a well-known businessman and supporter of the Jewish community in San Francisco.

Jacob Davis, a tailor in Reno, Nevada, was one of Levi Strauss' regular customers. In 1872, he wrote a letter to Strauss about his method of making work pants with metal rivets on the stress points—at the corners of the pockets and the base of the button fly—to make them stronger. As Davis didn't have the money for the necessary paperwork, he suggested that Strauss provide the funds and that the two men get the patent together. Strauss agreed enthusiastically, and the patent for "Improvement in Fastening Pocket-Openings"—the innovation that would produce blue jeans as we know them—was granted to both men on May 20, 1873.

Strauss brought Davis to San Francisco to oversee the first manufacturing facility for "waist overalls," as the original jeans were known. At first they employed seamstresses working out of their homes, but by the 1880s, Strauss had opened his own factory. The famous 501brand jean–known until 1890 as "XX"–was soon a bestseller, and the company grew quickly. By the 1920s, Levi's denim waist overalls were the top-selling men's

work pant in the United States. As decades passed, the craze only grew, and now blue jeans are worn by men and women, young and old, around the world.






Gold miners wearing Levi's jeans circa 1882

Full Flower Moon

This Tuesday, May 23rd, is the full moon known as the Full Flower Moon.

We use Full Moon names that were used during Native American and Colonial times to help track the seasons. Depending on the tribe, May's Full Moon was called the Full Flower Moon as well as Mother's Moon, Milk Moon, and Corn Planting Moon. The May Moon marked a time of increasing fertility, with temperatures warm enough for safely bearing young, a near end to late frosts, and plants in bloom.

The fool moon in May got the name "Flower Moon" because flowers spring forth in **abundance** this month. The name Milk Moon may come from the fact that May is a time when so many animals bear and begin nursing their young. But cows would not have been included with that group as they are not native to the Americas.

The Ontario Native Literacy Coalition notes that while the Ojibwe tribes of the Great Lakes area called the May full moon a Flower Moon ("Waawaaskone Giizis"), people of the Cree Nation in northern Montana and parts of Canada named it the Frog Moon because this was the time of year frogs became active.

Although many Native American tribes gave distinct names to the full moon, the most well known full moon names come from the Algonquin tribes who lived in the area of New England and westward to Lake Superior. The Algonquin tribes had perhaps the greatest effect on the early European settlers in America, and the settlers adopted the Native American habit of naming the full moons.

As with all full moons, the one in May goes by many names:

Sioux - Moon When the Ponies Shed
Shawnee - Strawberry Moon
Potawatomi (Great Lakes) - Strawberry Moon
Mohawk - Time of Big Leaf Moon
Hopi - Moon of Waiting
Cree - Frog Moon
Kalapuya (Pacific NW) - Camas Blooming Time
Choctaw - Moon of Mulberry and Panther Moon

Cherokee - Planting Moon Passamaquoddy (NE US) - Alewive Moon (Alewife is a fish) Apache - Season When the Leaves Are Green Moon Winnebago - Hoeing-Corn Moon Tlingit (Pacific NW) - Moon Before Pregnancy Algonquin - Moon When Women Weed Corn Chippewa - Blossom Moon Arapaho - Moon When the Ponies Shed Their Shaggy Hair Shoshone - Budding Moon Abenaki (Maine) - Field Maker Moon Cheyenne - Moon When the Horses Get Fat Comanche - Flower Moon Assiniboine (Northern Plains) - Idle Moon Lakota - Moon of the Green Leaves Creek - Mulberry Moon Zuni - No Name Moon Haida (Alaska) - Food-Gathering Moon

Often the moon will look a bit redder in the Northern Hemisphere during warmer months, as the moonlight has to travel through more atmosphere to reach one's eyes. The best times for these effects are usually near the rising and setting times.



What a great picture of the inside of a dry goods store (maybe the Powers Store) in Kingsbury probably in the 1910s.

There are kerosine lanterns on the counter and hanging from the ceiling and the boys are probably standing in front of a wood burning stove because there is a stovepipe behind them. There are some washtubs hanging on the back wall and what looks like buggy whips hanging from a ceiling rack on the right.

The shelves on the right have a <u>ton</u> of glass shades for kerosine lamps. When you're primarily using a lamp for your light, I'm guessing the shades get broken from time to time and this store has your replacement right on hand. On the counter next to the kerosine lamp is a big glass jar with what looks like nuts.

The big bags next to the boys look like potatoes the the crates on the left are definintely potatoes. That's a <u>lot</u> of potatoes! And there is a stack of boxes on the floor under the wash tubs with lye. I'm not sure why you would need a big box of lye, except for maybe making soap. The glass counter on the left is apparently the cigar section. And the shelves are fully stocked with canned goods and probably cans of kerosine and tobacco.

I wish I could tell what those five things are hanging on the wall under the wash tubs, but I guess they will remain a mystery!
